They began testing recipes in their South Anchorage home and today the Alaska Chip Company processes 3,000 to 4,000 pounds of Alaska Grown potatoes daily, creating approximately 800 pounds of kettle chips. The ingredients are all natural, cooked in peanut oil, contain no preservatives or cholesterol, and are low in salt.
