Alternative Concepts Developed for Gates of the Arctic Plan Amendment

The National Park Service interdisciplinary planning team for Gates of the Arctic National Park & Preserve has developed 4 preliminary draft alternative concepts for amending the existing 1986 general management plan (GMP). The team also has proposed 5 management zones for the park which generally identify how different areas could be managed to achieve resource preservation, provide for recreational access and use, and serve operational purposes. The NPS is soliciting public comments on the alternative concepts, management zones and other issues by November 15, 2010. Meetings are scheduled in Fairbanks and in Anchorage. Park staff will also visit Allakaket, Anaktuvuk, Bettles and Coldfoot to discuss ideas and concerns of local resi-

Wilderness Reviews to be Conducted in ANWR

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service has announced that it will conduct wilderness reviews of almost all non-wilderness lands in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. Lands in the so called "1002 Area" on the coastal plain will be included in the review. The USFWS will look at three Wilderness Study Areas (WSA) for potential inclusion within the National Wilderness Preservation System. In conducting a wilderness review for each WSA, the refuge will evaluate

whether a recommendation to designate wilderness would assist in achieving refuge purposes and maintain biological integrity. The refuge will analyze values (e.g., ecological, recreational, cultural, economic, symbolic), resources (e.g., wildlife, water, vegetation, minerals, soils), public uses, and refuge management activities within each area. The analysis will also assess whether the refuge can effectively

Ketchikan-Misty Fiords Ranger District Outfitter/Guide Management Plan EIS

The Ketchikan-Misty Fiords Ranger District (KMRD) in the Tongass National Forest is seeking public involvement and information on recreational use within the district for an Outfitter/Guide Management Plan. The Management Plan will include all 3.2 million acres of the KMRD including all of the Misty Fiords National Monument Wilderness. The Proposed Action, developed with input from 10 collaborative meetings that ran from early 2009 through April 2010, is to allocate about 54,000 visitor days (of the estimated capacity of approximately 148,000 days) annually for outfitter and guide use on KMRD. Adaptive management may increase or decrease allocations for specific areas based on standards and the level of effects.

KMRD will prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Outfitter/Guide Management Plan project that will display the alternatives considered and disclose the environmental impacts of each alternative. The decision on the EIS will set outfitter and guide use levels but will not limit or regulate use by unguided visitors. There will be no limitations on unguided use from this project.

Record of Decision Signed for Final Legislative Environmental Impact Statement—Glacier Bay National Park

The National Park Service Alaska Region has issued a Record of Decision for the Final Legislative Environmental Impact Statement (FLEIS) for the harvest of glaucous-winged gull eggs by Huna Tlingit in Glacier Bay National Park. Harvest of gull eggs was prohibited in the 1960s with the implementation of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. The agency conducted studies and prepared the LEIS as directed in the *Glacier Bay National Park Resource Management Act of 2000* (Public Law 106-455).

The NPS selected an alternative that, if implemented through enactment of

legislation, could authorize the annual harvest of glaucous-winged gull eggs at up to five designated locations in Glacier Bay National Park. Any legislative proposal from the NPS is subject to review by the Department of the Interior and the President before it can be transmitted to Congress.

If legislation is enacted authorizing the egg harvest, each year the NPS and Huna Indian Association would prepare a harvest plan to identify sites open to harvest based on annual monitoring and harvest history.

manage each WSA to preserve its wilderness character. The evaluation will consider a "Wilderness Alternative" and a "No Wilderness Alternative" in order to compare the benefits and impacts of managing each area as wilderness as opposed to managing the area under an alternate set of goals, objectives, and strategies that would not involve wilderness designation.

If the wilderness reviews lead to a recommendation to give wilderness status to any of the WSAs, the recommendation would require approval by the Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, the Secretary of the Interior, and the President of the United States. If a recommendation receives the support of all of these parties, the President would submit it to Congress, which alone has

the authority to make final decisions on any proposed wilderness designation. As part of the planning process for Alaska refuges, the Service has authority to inventory, study, and possibly propose areas suitable for wilderness within the National Wilderness Preservation System.

The wilderness reviews are expected to be completed by February, 2011. The Service plans to release a draft revised Comprehensive Conservation Plan for Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, which will include the wilderness reviews, for public review and comment in March, 2011. After thoroughly evaluating all comments on that draft, the Service plans to issue the final plan and record of decision, incorporating any recommendations arising from the wilderness reviews, in May, 2012.
