Prospectus Released for Glacier Bay Lodge and Tours

On January 4, 2013, Superintendent Susan Boudreau announced the release of a prospectus soliciting proposals for the Glacier Bay Lodge concession operation in Glacier Bay National Park & Preserve.

Glacier Bay Lodge is an architecturally award winning 56-room lodge located in Bartlett Cove near the community of Gustavus. The primary services to be provided will include lodging, food and beverage services, a daily vessel tour of Glacier Bay, camper



drop-off and pick-up services, vehicle transportation services between Gustavus and Bartlett Cove, gift and sundry sales and marine fuel sales.

The services are currently provided by Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve Concessions, LLC. Its concession contract expires on December 31, 2013. The new contract will have a 10-year term commencing in 2014. The prospectus includes the financial terms of the contract, utilization and operating information,

a market area overview and the selection factors used to award the contract. Of particular note, the Alaska Marine Highway System began providing ferry service between Juneau and Gustavus in 2010. The ferry service adds a lower-cost alternative (as well as vehicle transport) between Juneau and Gustavus.

BLM Director Explains Rejected Governor Parnell's Recommendation Regarding Consistency Review Determination in Published Notice

The Bureau of Land Management has published a notice on January 22, 2013, to explain why the BLM Director is rejecting the Alaska Governor's recommendations regarding the Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact for the Delta River Special Recreation Management Area (SRMA) Plan and East Alaska Resource Management Plan (EARMP) Amendment. A brief summary of the correspondence begins on July 25, 2011, the BLM released the Environmental Assessment (EA) and Finding of No Significant Impact for the Delta River SRMA Plan and the EARMP Amendment. On September 20, 2011, the Governor of Alaska submitted a Governor's Consistency Review Finding of Inconsistency for the EA and Finding of No Significant Impact for the Delta River SRMA Plan and EARMP Amendment (Finding) to the BLM Alaska State Director. The State Director determined the Governor's Finding was outside the scope of the Governor's Consistency Review process and did not accept the Governor's recommendations. A written response was sent to the Governor on March 28, 2012, addressing issues raised in the Governor's Finding, and informing him of clarifications made to the BLM's Decision Record for the project. On April 27, 2012, the Governor appealed the State Director's decision not to accept his recommendations to the BLM Director. The BLM Director issued a final response to the Governor affirming the State Director's decision and made minor revisions to the final decision record for the project to address some of the Governor's concerns. Rural Determination Process for the Subsistence Management Program for Public Lands in Alaska

Federal subsistence regulations require that the rural or nonrural status of communities or areas or regulation concerning the rural determination process. The Board will consider Tribes' and be reviewed every 10 years. In 2009, the Secretary of the Interior initiated a review of the Federal Subsistence Management Program. An ensuing directive was for the Federal Subsistence Board (Board) to review its process for determining the rural and nonrural status of communities. As a result, the Board has initiated a review of the rural determination process and is requesting comments from the public.

The Federal Subsistence Regional Advisory Councils have a substantial role in reviewing subsistence issues and making recommendations to the Board. The Federal Subsistence Board, through the Councils, will hold public meetings to accept comments on this notice between August and October 2013. You may present comments on this notice during those meetings at various locations in Alaska. Meeting location and times will be advertised in local and statewide newspapers, and be posted on the Web. For additional information online visit: http://alaska.fws.gov/asm/ index.cfml.

The Board will engage in outreach efforts for this notice, including a notification letter, to ensure that Tribes and Alaska Native corporations are advised of the mechanisms by which they can participate. The Board will commit to efficiently and adequately providing an opportunity to Tribes to the Designated Federal Official attending any of the Federal Subsistence Regional and Alaska Native corporations to prior to the adoption of any changes in policy

Alaska Native corporations' information, input, and recommendations, and endeavor to address their concerns.

The Board requests input from the public on the rural determination process and regulations, and ways to improve them for the benefit of rural Alaskans. The Board has identified the following components in the process for review: Population thresholds, rural characteristics, aggregation of communities, timelines, and information sources.

All the comments received will be used by the Board, in coordination with the Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture, to assist in making decisions regarding the scope and nature of possible changes to improve the rural determination process.

Senator Murkowski Introduces Bill to Restore Subsistence Harvest of Gull Eggs in Southeast Alaska

On January 28, 2013, U.S. Sen. Lisa Murkowski reintroduced legislation restoring the traditional rights of the Huna Tlingit to gather glaucouswinged gull eggs in Glacier Bay National Park as part of their subsistence hunting activities. "The Huna Tlingit have gathered gull eggs as part of their traditional subsistence activities for centuries – certainly long before Glacier Bay was made into a national park," Murkowski said. "Gull eggs are part of their traditional diet and cultural identity, and I believe it's an activity they should be allowed to continue legally." Glacier Bay National Park in Southeast Alaska is the ancestral homeland of the Huna Tlingit, who traditionally harvested gull eggs at rookeries from the cliffs of Glacier Bay prior to, and following, establishment of the park. Collection was prohibited in the 1960s under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and National Park Service regulations. The National Park Service determined in 2010 that annual harvests would not harm the gull populations in the park, but congressional action is still required to authorize gull egg collection. Murkowski's legislation would allow tribal members of the Hoonah Indian Association to collect gull eggs up to two times a year at as many as five locations within Glacier Bay National Park.

Murkowski introduced similar legislation in 2011, during the 112th Congress. Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska, plans to introduce companion legislation in the U.S. House of Representatives.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Eastern Interior Field Office has announced the initial schedule of public meetings for a Supplement to the Eastern Interior Draft Resource Management Plan and Environmental Impact Statement (RMP/EIS). The Supplement amends Alternative D of the Draft RMP/EIS to address hardrock mineral leasing in the White Mountains National Recreation Area. The Supplement and the full Draft RMP/ EIS are both available for public comment through April 11, 2013.

The BLM is holding public meetings to help familiarize the public with the Supplement and to gather public comments. The field office may schedule additional meetings in other communities in March and will announce those meetings on the BLM website at www.blm.gov/ak.

Alaska's National Parks invite public comment on each park's compendium through February 15, 2013

The NPS is proposing to prohibit the take of wolves and covotes between May 1 and August 9 in the following national preserves: Denali, Gates of the Arctic, Katmai, Aniakchak, Alagnak Wild River, Lake Clark, Wrangell-St. Elias, and Yukon-Charley Rivers. In some or all areas within these preserves, recent



This year, the National Park Service is proposing restrictions to taking wildlife changes to State hunting regulations allow wolves and coyotes (including pups) to be taken in late spring and summer. The NPS has stated that the proposed shorter season is more consistent with federal subsistence regulations.

> The proposed compendiums for Denali, Wrangell-St. Elias and Yukon-Charley Rivers also include a prohibition on the taking of brown bears at a bait station. In addition, the NPS proposes to renew a temporary prohibition on using artificial light to take black bears at dens and taking black bear sows with cubs at dens in Denali and Gates of the Arctic National Preserves. The NPS is proposing these changes to State regulations because the agency has determined that these practices are inconsistent with its policies for managing national preserves.

> Public involvement in the compendium process began in early December when the National Park Service held the first of seven public hearings to hear input as these restrictions were being drafted. After this round of public comment on the compendium provisions ends on February 15, the NPS will consider revisions and expects to publish the final compendiums in April 2013.



Proposed Establishment of a Nonessential Experimental Population of Wood Bison in Alaska

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service), in cooperation with the State of Alaska, propose to establish a nonessential experimental population of wood bison in central Alaska, in accordance with section 10(j) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973. This proposal, if made final, would also establish provisions under which wood bison in Alaska would be managed. We are seeking comments on this proposal and on our draft environmental assessment which analyzes the potential environmental impacts associated with the proposed reintroduction.




Figure 1. Boundaries of the wood bison NEP (black line) and location of the three sites (Continued on page 7)

Under the Endangered Species Act, the Service may establish an experimental population, allowing for the reintroduction of a species to its former range with special rules that allow for some of the management requirements of the ESA to be relaxed to facilitate acceptance by local landowners and managers. The Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) proposes to reintroduce wood bison into one or more of three areas within their historical range in central Alaska, specifically the Yukon Flats, Minto Flats, and the lower Innoko/Yukon River area, see Figure 1. If this proposed rule is adopted, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) would have primary management responsibility for leading and implementing the wood bison restoration effort, in cooperation with the Service. ADF&G would serve as the lead agency in the reintroduction and subsequent management of wood bison in Alaska; however, ADF&G would continue to coordinate with the Service on these restoration efforts. Management of populations in the area would be guided by provisions in: (1) The





associated special rule; (2) the EA for this action and ADF&G's environmental review; and (3) management plans developed for each area by ADF&G with involvement of landowners and other stakeholders. The rule would also allow for future regulated hunting based on sustained yield principles, once the herds are deemed sufficiently resilient to support such.

We particularly seek comments concerning: (1) Any information on the biological or ecological requirements of wood bison; (2) Current or planned activities in the proposed nonessential experimental population area; (3) Current or planned management of the NEP population; and (4) Any information concerning the boundaries of the proposed NEP area.
