## The FY 2020 CLG priorities for grant funding are:

- 1. Projects that increase public awareness of historic preservation and establish new partnerships, particularly with local tribes and under-represented groups, to strengthen their local historic preservation program. This year, projects that address the centennial of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment (women's suffrage) and the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act are of priority. Also encouraged are projects that install interpretive signs calling attention to significant historic places, and produce educational materials emphasizing historic preservation and that educate property owners about historic preservation laws and programs, especially about archaeological resources on lots with buildings.
- 2. Projects that address the rehabilitation of historic properties and leverage funds and resources. Restoring and preserving defining elements of historic properties and addressing sustainability of them are encouraged.
- 3. Projects that update plans, review ordinances, create local registers, draft local tax incentives, and determine design review guidelines. Use of a consultant to assist in addressing local historic preservation issues is encouraged.
- 4. Projects that address survey and evaluation of properties. Archaeological projects, in urban and rural areas, and for prehistoric and historic sites, are encouraged. Related to this, projects that record information on traditional Native places and place names are of priority.
