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Office of History and Archaeology news

Historic Preservation Grants

Historic Preservation development and pre-development grants

The Office of History & Archaeology is accepting grant applications for *historic preservation development* and *pre-development* projects in Alaska. The application deadline is 4:00 p.m. on Friday, September 30, 2022. The application package is available online at http://dnr.alaska.gov/parks/oha/index.htm or by contacting the Office of History and Archaeology at dnr.oha@alaska.gov. All projects would need to be completed by December 15, 2023.

The Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) grant program provides 50 percent matching assistance for the development or pre-development grant. Development grants are for rehabilitation or restoration of Alaska buildings and structures listed in the National Register of Historic Places, individually or as contributing properties to a historic district. Pre-development grants are for

Alaska buildings and structures on or eligible for the National Register.

The Office of History & Archaeology anticipates \$200,000 will be available to award to eligible projects. Pre-development requests are limited to \$3,500 minimum and \$15,000 maximum in matching assistance. Development requests have a \$10,000 minimum and \$50,000 maximum in matching assistance.

Preserve Alaska Grants

The Office of History and Archaeology is launching a new reimbursable grant program designed to encourage Alaskan communities to identify, interpret, designate, develop heritage tourism plans, or survey special places that 1) convey important aspects of their unique heritage and 2) contribute to local tourism.

Preserve Alaska grants aim to encourage historic preservation at the local level by supporting heritage/cultural tourism programs and other preservation efforts that use historic properties and sites to stimulate economic vitality and community revitalization. Individuals, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, state agencies, or Tribes are eligible to apply. All projects would need to be completed by December 15, 2023.

The state grant program provides 50 percent reimbursement for the cost of the grant projects with documented match expenses or eligible in-kind services. Grants will be accepted in the following categories:

- Survey, Inventory
- Historic Preservation Planning
- Historic Contexts & National Register Nominations
- Historic Preservation Education and Interpretive Material

The Office of History & Archaeology anticipates \$200,000 will be available to award to eligible projects. Grants can range from a minimum of \$4,000 and a maximum of \$40,000 State share. A 50/50 match is required for these reimbursable grants. Application deadline is 4:00 pm on Friday September 30, 2022. Federal Legislation news

The U.S. House passed a 6-bill minibus for FY 2023 funding on July 20. It contained the Department of Interior budget, including the Historic Preservation Fund in the amount of \$170.825. For SHPOs, the House proposes \$58.675 million, a \$1 million dollar increase over FY22 funding level. Tribal Historic Preservation Offices proposed amount is \$23 million, an increase of \$7 million over FY22. The Senate plans to release their appropriations bills at the end of July.

State Legislation News

On June 30, Governor Dunleavy signed the FY23 State Budget. It contained level funding for the Office of History and Archaeology and included award of the supplemental budget request to provide matching State funds for the FY22 Historic Preservation Fund grants received by the Alaska State Historic Preservation Office. These funds were pivotal to enable the Development and Preserve Alaska grants and maintain current staffing levels at OHA/SHPO.

On July 28, Governor Dunleavy signed House Bill 123, formally recognizing Alaska's 229 federally recognized tribes. <u>Alaska State Legislature (akleg.gov)</u>

National Park Service news

Congratulations to Brooke Merrell, the new superintendent at Denali National Park and Preserve. Brooke previously served as the deputy superintendent and was the acting superintendent for the past 9 months.

The National Historic Landmarks Program announced release of a new theme study, *Labor History in the United States*, which highlights the many stories of Americans at work through current scholarship on labor history and nationally significant places. In addition to a discussion of existing and potential labor history National Historic Landmarks, the context can also inform National Register of Historic Places nominations. NPS Grant opportunities:

The National Park Service's **Tribal Historic Preservation Program** grant program is accepting grant applications for about \$500,000 that will be available in the fall 2022. https://www.nps.gov/subjects/historicpreservationfund/tribal-heritage-grants.htm

Tribal Heritage grant award recipients announced in July, 2022, included two Alaskan tribes:

- Ahtna, Inc., Ahtna-Yakutat Elders Project, \$50,000
- Knik Tribe, Fish Creek Village Pedestrian Survey and Mapping Project, \$37,814

National Park Service's <u>Underrepresented Communities Grant Program (URC)</u> works towards diversifying the nominations submitted to the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u>. URC grants are funded by the <u>Historic Preservation Fund (HPF)</u>, and are administered by the NPS. Projects include surveys and inventories of historic properties associated with communities underrepresented in the National Register, as well as the development of nominations to the National Register for specific sites. Congress has appropriated \$1.25 million for the URC Grant Program. All projects must result in the submission of a new nomination to the National Register of Historic Places or <u>National Historic Landmark Program</u>, or an amendment to an existing nomination to include underrepresented communities. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal match. The URC grant opportunity number is <u>P22AS00294</u>. National Parks Service's **African American Civil Rights (AACR) grants** program (P22AS00647 and P22AS00648) is to preserve and protect sites associated with the struggle for equality from the transatlantic slave trade forward. Applications due November 8, 2022. For more information go to **African American Civil Rights Grant Program**

NPS grant program <u>History of Equal Rights</u> (P22AS00644) is to preserve and protect sites associated with efforts to achieve equal rights. The History of Equal Rights grants are not limited to any specific group and are intended to include the broadest possible interpretation of equal rights for any American. Application deadline September 14, 2022.

The National Register is actively working to update and reissue National Register Bulletin 38: *Traditional Cultural Properties*. A draft has been completed and is under internal review. A draft for tribal consultation, and partner and public engagement, is expected to be released by early fall 2022, kicking off a 16-month schedule for consultation, external engagement, and document development.

ACHP/HUD award

Apply now for the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) 2022-2023 ACHP/HUD Secretary's Award for Excellence in Historic Preservation! This joint award honors outstanding projects that have advanced the goals of historic preservation while promoting affordable housing, community revitalization, and/or enhanced economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income families and individuals.

Projects or activities must have been completed or have made substantial achievements within the last three years and have done the following:

- Promoted the use of historic buildings for affordable housing, community development, and/or expanded economic opportunities
- Included HUD funds or financing
- Met preservation guidelines
- Contributed to local community revitalization efforts

Two awards will be presented in summer 2023, as the award schedule is transitioned from fall to summer.

Submissions for the 2022-2023 cycle are due by 11:59 p.m. PDT on August 15, 2022.
