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Office of History and Archaeology new Alaska Maritime Heritage Program

Federal Legislation news

The Historic Preservation Fund Program authorization expires September 30, 2023. The bipartisan **Historic Preservation Fund Reauthorization Act** (H.R.3350), reauthorizes the HPF for 10 years and increases the authorization to \$250 million annually.

July 12, the House Appropriations Committee Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies released their FY24 proposed <u>appropriations bill</u>. House Appropriations Committee Chair Rep. Kay Granger (R-TX) announced her intention to markup FY 2024 spending bills at FY 2022 funding levels, which would yield an estimated \$120 billion reduction in federal spending. It reflects a 25% cut in non-defense spending below FY2023 enacted levels. The House proposal outlines funding for the Historic Preservation Fund at \$175.4 million for FY24. The House bill does not authorize congressionally directed spending. The House proposal provides for level HPF funding less earmarks. The HPF is currently funded at \$204.5 million and in FY22 was funded at \$173.072 million.

NPS Grant opportunities:

The National Park Service's **African American Civil Rights (AACR) Grant Program** is now accepting applications. The goal of the AACR Program is to preserve and protect sites associated with the long struggle for equality from the transatlantic slave trade forward. These grants fund a broad range of preservation projects including physical preservation of historic structures, prepreservation planning, National Register nominations, oral histories, education and interpretation.

Development of a Nationwide Programmatic Agreement for Cultural Resources Financial Assistance

The National Park Service (NPS) Cultural Resources, Partnerships, and Science Directorate provides Federal financial assistance to advance its mission in the protection and interpretation of the nation's heritage. Congress authorized NPS to provide Federal financial assistance to States, Tribes, local governments, and other partners to advance the purposes of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) among other similar purposes. Projects, activities, or programs that are carried out with Federal financial assistance are considered undertakings (36 CFR § 800.16(y)) requiring compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (54 U.S.C. § 306108).

NPS proposes to develop a Nationwide Programmatic Agreement (Nationwide PA) that creates an efficient and consistent Section 106 process for its cultural resources financial assistance undertakings. The proposed Nationwide PA will include cultural resources activities that are considered undertakings under Section 106 within its grant programs and cooperative agreements. Advisory Council on Historic Preservation news

On March 1, 2023, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) voted unanimously to adopt its new *Policy Statement on Burial Sites, Human Remains, and Funerary Objects*. The policy statement establishes a set of standards and guidelines that federal and state agencies, contractors, and other relevant entities should, at a minimum, seek to implement in order to provide burial sites, human remains, and funerary objects the consideration and protection they deserve.

Consistent with that policy, the ACHP has developed the attached <u>Policy Statement on Burial Sites, Human Remains, and Funerary Objects: Explanation and Discussion</u> guidance document to provide ACHP staff, federal agencies, state and local governments, and nongovernmental institutions and private developers with additional context, guidance, and advice on the interpretation and implementation of each principle contained in the policy. This guidance document was informed by the comments provided by consulting parties during its development and references multiple resources that offer further information on the how to best consider burial sites, human remains, and funerary objects in decision making.

Funding ranges from \$2,500 to \$5,000 and supports preservation planning and educational projects. The next deadline is October 1.
