








Safety is no accident



Achievements like these are a function of true teamwork. Our workers share a commitment to working smarter, safer and better each and every day. Their record of success makes us proud.



Permitting Modifications - Approved

- Operate Pearl Creek Causeway during construction
- Operate TSF during construction
- Operate Heap Leach Stage I
- Operate Heap Leach Stage II
- Operate Heap Leach in the Stage II configuration at a solution application rate of 9100 gpm
- Establish borrow area by Barnes Creek Road for sub-grade material for Stage III of Heap Leach
- Construct a connection from the Barnes Creek Road to the existing access road
- Renewal of Water Dam Approval to Operate
- Construct a Heap Leach haul road and tunnel
- Raise TSF embankment 52 feet in two stages




2011

- ACOE permit requires mitigation for additional 16.31 acres of wetlands; completed through in-lieu fee of \$185,537 paid to The Conservation Fund (\$11,375 per acre)
- Complete construction of 27' raise of TSF to 1515 fmsl


Tailing Dam Design


Tailing Pumping and Deposition Plan




Dam Breach Analysis



- •270 acres scarified, seeded, and fertilized








Mine Production (tons, 000s)




