Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) potential updating of regulations 11 AAC 93.142-147, implementing AS 46.15.145 Reservation of Water.

Rabbit Creek Community Council (RCCC) is a community organization representing residents and property owners in a delineated geographic area of <u>southeast Anchorage</u>. RCCC is an advisory group within Anchorage's Community Council system established in the Anchorage Municipal Charter. RCCC, through its Land Use and Transportation Committee, reviewed the issues surrounding water reservations, particularly as they pertain to Potter Marsh. At a General Meeting of the membership on November 14, 2024, RCCC voted to submit comments and questions, detailed in the attachment, by a vote of 26 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention.

In summary, RCCC advocates for:

- a reservation system that prioritizes protecting the natural hydrologic function (including water quality and quantity) of waterbodies.
- DNR to provide a clear context, with associated data and analyses, from which we, and the general public, can provide meaningful, detailed comments on the 11 AAC 43 regulations.
- Prompt extension of the Alaska Department of Fish & Game water reservations on Rabbit Creek, Little Rabbit Creek, and Little Survival Creek, the three streams that feed Potter Marsh, based on our local knowledge of Potter Marsh and creeks within our Council area.
- Periodic review of all water appropriations so that DNR does not grant permanent allocations that may not be sustainable.

- Pro-active DNR management, including baseline data collection, analyses of hydrologic systems, and the means to enforce water rights, especially in areas of water resource competition, such as our Anchorage Hillside.
- Improved public outreach and public education related to any appropriations of water.
 Public notices are needed that more clearly define the purposes and processes for proposed actions regarding all types of DNR appropriation of water similar to that previously provided by the former Alaska Water Resources Board. This includes convening public meetings related to scoping and proposed regulation changes.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on DNR's regulations for water reservations.

The Rabbit Creek Community Council (RCCC) has reviewed issues, and the limited information provided for the proposed updating of regulations 11 AAC 93.142-147, implementing AS 46.15.145 Reservation of Water. This review gives us serious concerns about the proposal and leads us to comment on one specific action and three general concerns, as follows, and as approved at our General Membership Meeting on November 14, 2024, by a vote of 26 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention.

1. <u>Lack of public outreach regarding water rights for Potter Marsh and the potential regulation revisions.</u>

Regarding Potter Marsh, RCCC is very concerned that our Council—and presumably the affected public—have been ignorant of the issue of water reservations on three tributary creeks to Potter Marsh. The Alaska Department of Natural Resources (DNR) should provide direct notice to affected parties and, at a minimum, groups such as the RCCC and Friends of the Anchorage Coastal Wildlife Refuge, as part of its adjudicatory review of those water reservations and any proposed actions. We suggest that you add interested organizations and groups representing geographic areas where water reservations exist for proposed actions affecting them including options for public meetings. For future decisions affecting the Potter Marsh watershed please contact us in advance in a timely manner via email at rabbitcreekcc@gmail.com; our mailing address is c/o Federation of Community Councils, 1057 West Fireweed Lane, Suite 100, Anchorage, AK 99503.

Regarding the DNR public notice for potential changes to 11 AAC 93, the outreach seems vague and obfuscating. How can the public evaluate potential changes without any knowledge of why changes might be warranted; or what those changes might be, especially as they relate to earlier public suggestions on scoping exercises such as in 2016? By comparison, when RCCC is given an opportunity to comment on a municipal regulatory change, we typically receive a written staff analysis that includes background, data, an objective analysis of current regulations, and a range of recommended changes. We believe a similar analysis of the outcomes from this exercise should also include DNR's proposed implementation timeline. The public should also be provided an opportunity to comment on proposed future actions so DNR can weigh that input as part of their final determinations.

2. Extend the water reservations acquired by Alaska Department of Fish & Game for three creeks to ensure recharge of Potter Marsh.

RCCC just became aware that, since the 1980s, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) has held in-stream reservations on three creeks that replenish Potter Marsh: Rabbit Creek, Little Rabbit Creek, and Little Survival Creek. Similarly, RCCC recently became aware that these water reservations are long-overdue for extension and is herein requesting prompt extension of these water reservations for the following reasons:

- The incalculable value of Potter Marsh to the entire Anchorage community and visitors. Potter Marsh is the jewel of the Alaska Coastal Wildlife Refuge, allowing urban residents effortless access to view and enjoy a myriad species of iconic Alaskan wildlife, including trumpeter swans, spawning salmon, Arctic terns, and concentrations of moose in early spring.
- The three creeks with ADF&G reservations are anadromous despite their fairly small sizes. Instream reservations are important to maintain seasonal flows and habitat conditions that sustain fish populations.
- As a State Critical Habitat and Wildlife Refuge, Potter Marsh has significant habitat values for countless bird species that use it as an important spring and fall migratory stop and others that nest and raise their young here. Those habitat values are directly related to the water flows, and thus instream reservations.
- O Potter Marsh clearly serves the public interest. Over 150,000 visitors annually spend time at the north-end boardwalk in all seasons. The middle and south parts of the Marsh host diverse recreation uses, including birdwatching, photography, skiing and skating. In addition, drive-through viewers on the Seward Highway number at least 10,000 vehicles per day on average.
- The reservations pose no diminishment of other uses. In fact, healthy creeks enhance the surrounding residential setting and add to property values.
- RCCC has a decades-long history of advocating for Potter Marsh as a thriving ecosystem that provides recreation and passive enjoyment.
- Public and private investment in the marsh are hard evidence of the public value of Potter Marsh and its watershed:
 - ADF&G and partnership funding for a paved pull-out at South Potter Marsh.
 - RCCC's successful grant application to the Municipality in 2020-2021 for additional amenities at the South Potter Marsh Pull-out.
 - The collaboration of the Municipality, the Great Land Trust, and citizen donors to create the nascent 300-acre Potter Marsh Watershed Park immediately uphill of Potter Marsh to protect a network of small tributaries that recharge the south end of Potter Marsh.

We are disappointed there is no public signage in Potter Marsh discussing the existing reservations of water, their purposes and values, and urge DNR to work with ADF&G to provide this information. Regarding the ADF&G water reservations for Rabbit Creek, Little Rabbit Creek and Little Survival Creek, the public value of these reservations is incontrovertible. We respectfully request the prompt extension of these water reservations.

3. General concerns and questions regarding potential revisions to the water reservation regulations

In general, RCCC opposes changes to the 11 AAC 93 regulations that would diminish the maintenance of water quality and quantity in freshwater streams, lakes, estuaries, and groundwaters. RCCC asks DNR to place high value on the cultural and socioeconomic

importance and benefits of reserving water in rivers and streams for fisheries, tourism and recreation. Regarding water resources in our locality:

- Our local <u>Hillside District Plan</u> (Municipality of Anchorage, 2010) has environmental quality goals and associated policies that explicitly or implicitly favor maintaining our natural hydrologic systems, including:
 - "... protecting natural systems such as aquifer recharge areas and stream corridors" (Goal 5).
 - "... maintain and protect environmental quality at ...[the] watershed [scale] (Goal 5, Policy 5-A).
 - Create a Riparian Greenbelt Acquisition Program (Goal 5, Policy 5-C).
 - Protect existing stream and wetland functions by maintaining the natural quantity, quality, and periodicity of recharge to natural waterbodies and wetlands (Goal 8).

RCCC's research on the issue of water allocations revealed the problem of insufficient baseline data and analyses for Anchorage waterbodies, and indeed statewide waterbodies. We were alarmed to learn that neither DNR nor apparently any other agency systematically collects baseline water resource data in Anchorage. Similarly, we are unaware of any local regional and statewide water availability and use plans that project the amounts of water available and the potential demands of water over time to ensure water is managed in the best public interest under AS 46,15.080. This seems to be a serious shortcoming for both current and future management of such a critical resource as water and to identify if future water delivery infrastructure will be required to cost-effectively meet all competing water demands

We understand that while reservations of water are subject to a 10-year review and extension, water appropriations for withdrawals, diversions, and impoundments are not. This seems out-of-balance. Appropriations (withdrawals of water) should be regarded as the 'harvestable surplus' from water bodies, and subject to periodic review. DNR should not grant de facto permanent withdrawals of water. As our climate is changing, water flows and timing are changing, affecting fish and wildlife habitats. What may have been a reasonable appropriation at one time, may no longer be sustainable.

4. General concerns regarding the lack of public education and outreach on water resources issues

Our Community Council has long-been concerned about cyclic and long-term water scarcity at our local level. Much of our area uses on-site systems for water and septic. Some homeowners have wells that have gone dry or been compromised as additional homes have been built without data or understanding of the water resource capacity for current and future development in specific areas. New zoning policies from local leaders call for infill development and higher density on the Anchorage Hillside, without regard for water availability. Given that RCCC homeowner water resources are all uphill of Potter Marsh, continuing housing developments in our area have the potential to affect the waters flowing into and supporting Potter Marsh. But there is no program to collect data and determine how to avoid potential impacts. This is another reminder that inventorying existing water resources and projecting

long-term water use and needs demands (all types of beneficial uses of water) are essential to cost-effective water management and serving the best public interest.

RCCC residents are also frustrated by the apparent unenforceability of our DNR water rights for residential wells.

- Before revising regulations for water allocations, we urge DNR to address the overall lack of data and management capability of water resources.
- Specifically, we wonder whether the former Alaska Water Resources Board might be funded and reactivated to address these issues regionally and statewide, with local advisory boards from localities with water quantity or quality issues or competing uses for their water resources.

Here's the background:

Most of our RCCC residents rely on groundwater, through private residential wells or community wells. Some homes consistently experience water shortages—either chronically low flow wells or intermittently dry wells. These residents face expensive and inadequate remedies such as, holding tanks, pump truck deliveries, and fracking.

Some residents have obtained DNR water rights, but these seem to be entirely unenforceable because we lack scientific hydrologic data and models of how the groundwater system functions. There is no DNR or Municipality of Anchorage process to establish when existing water rights are, or could be, diminished by new development or climatic changes. New development impedes recharge of groundwater by increasing impervious surfaces and diverting water into the AWWU sanitary system. Wells for new development do not consider the effects on surrounding wells, except for very rarely required drawdown testing, as in the case of a large church expansion. Climate change, clearly, has impacts on recharge, such as more frequent winter run-off events instead of a slowly melting spring snowpack.

As inferred above we recommend and would appreciate DNR generating a public report on the results, analyses, recommendations, timelines, and conclusions for additional comment within the next 60 days or less. Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on DNR's water regulations.

SalmonState appreciates the opportunity to comment on DNR's proposed Updates and Revisions to Water Management Regulations (A.S. 46.15.145, 11 AAC 93141-147). SalmonState respectfully requests that DNR extend the open comment period for these proposed regulations by 60 days. The Alaska water management regulations are highly technical and complex and would have considerable implications to Alaska's waterbodies, wetlands, natural resources, and communities and residents. We request an extension of the public comment period to allow the public to review DNR's proposal and prepare comprehensive comments in response.

SalmonState is an Alaska based conservation effort, works to protect salmon habitat, and promote policies that will guarantee Alaska remains the SalmonState; the home of the world's largest, healthiest and most abundant wild salmon resource, which provides culture, food, income, employment and recreation to Alaskans, Americans and the rest of the world.

Alaska is known for its wild landscapes and abundant fish and wildlife. All these iconic characteristics hinge on clean and healthy waterbodies. As such, SalmonState is gravely concerned that significant changes to the water management regulations by DNR could jeopardize the water of the State, adversely impacting the fish, wildlife, and people of Alaska.

Alaskans are closely tied to the land and waters, and the summer and fall months are spent working, harvesting, and preparing for winter. The current public comment period provided by the DNR runs at a time when Alaskans are occupied with activities only available in the summer months, including offering ecotourism ventures, commercial fishing operations, harvesting flora and fauna to fill personal freezers, and conducting house, property, vehicle, and boat repairs and maintenance to name a few. Therefore, SalmonState requests that DNR respect and accommodate the limited time and resources available to Alaskans with interest in the health of the state's and nation's waters and wetlands during the busy Alaska summer and fall months by extending this public comment period by 60 days.

In contrast, applications for both a water right and temporary water use permit need only provide minimal information and descriptions about the water use and neither process requires data to demonstrate that the water withdrawal requested will not harm fish and wildlife habitat.

I am writing to let DNR know that I strongly oppose any changes to current water regulation that would weaken or reduce the current ability to acquire reservations of water for fish and wildlife.

I would however support changes that would reduce the current backlog of applications for reservations of water for fish and wildlife awaiting DNR review. I would support a system change where the burden of protection is on developers who would be required to collect five years of stream flow data needed to apply for a reservation of water – or one where a precautionary approach is applied, and water is reserved for fish as a standard baseline practice. These are my Public Scoping Comments in regards to potential changes to Water Management Regulations, as follows:

First, I respond to two questions set forth in the "Supplemental Notice of Public Scoping for Possible Updates and Revisions to Water Management Regulations," dated August 26, 2024. The two questions have to do with 11 AAC 93.146.

My response is NO to the first bullet, State Resource Agencies such as DNR or ADF&G should **NOT** be the only entities to hold a certificate of reservation of water.

My response is **NO CHANGE** to the second bullet. The entities that may apply for and hold a reservation of water should remain as it is today, i.e., a state, agency or a political subdivision of the state, an agency of the United States, or a person (AS 46.15.145(a). "Person" is defined at AS 46.14.990 (21) and AS 01.10.060(8), and includes individuals (i.e., natural person), businesses, non-profit organizations, nongovernmental organizations (i.e., NGOs), municipalities, University of Alaska, Alaska Railroad Corporation, etc..

All of these entities potentially have a legitimate and compelling interest in our public water and each should continue to have the right to apply for and hold a reservation of water.

Second, I respond to the third bullet of the Supplemental Notice, (i.e., 11 AAC 93.147) regarding reservation of water. My response is **YES**, review requirements are clear and adequate. The existing water reservations review process should **NOT BE CHANGED**.

The water environment is changing rapidly due largely to a changing climate. For example, drastic and even catastrophic changes are happening to our salmon, the causes of which are not fully understood. The existing regulation provides for a review of reservation in the event of change in the water resource. The regulation has a structure to analyze and reevaluate and make necessary changes to a reservation to ensure adequate availability of water. This flexibility is an absolute necessity in our world of climate change.

Third, salmon are a critical, keystone species. We humans depend on salmon in many ways... to feed ourselves and our families, to support sport fishing and related businesses such as guiding services, lodges, and to support those who choose a subsistence lifestyle. Water Management Regulations, above all, should support salmon, by ensuring sufficient water levels and maintaining sufficient instream flow to prevent undue warming of the water or imbalance in water chemistry. Water Management Regulation should also ensure water quality and adequate quantity so as to support a well functioning ecosystem and healthy terrestrial habitat.

Fourth, if DNR decides to move forward with proposed changes to water management regulations, it should have a robust public process. This means, among other things, reaching out to remote and rural towns and villages. Public meetings should not be an "Open House" format where the public wanders from agency person to agency person. It is difficult to get a coherent picture that way. Rather, a public meeting should provide for a formal public hearing

and be structured such that all attendees can hear what others have to say and listen to the testimony. Meeting transcripts and/or audio recordings should be posted and made publically available on the DNR or project website at least one week (preferably two weeks) in advance of the comment deadline date. On behalf of the Susitna River Coalition (SRC), a grassroots nonprofit based in Talkeetna, Alaska, representing over 14,000 individuals, businesses, and organizations dedicated to protecting the Susitna River Watershed, I submit this comment urging the preservation and strengthening of Alaska's instream water reservation system. This critical process safeguards the fish, wildlife, and communities that rely on the health of the Susitna River. As we consider regulatory changes, it is essential that Alaska continues to prioritize public interests, not just commercial or industrial uses, to protect our shared resources.

Across the Lower 48, we've witnessed firsthand the consequences of prioritizing industry over healthy ecosystems. Decisions made decades ago to maximize water extraction—often driven by the false assumption that unused water was wasted—have left rivers, lakes, and wells completely dry, leading to significant long-term harm. Competition for water, combined with the failure to fully account for ecological services and future demands, has decimated natural fish runs and disrupted essential ecological functions across much of the western United States. Many states now face the irreversible consequences of these decisions and, in many cases, are unable to implement corrective actions due to restrictive state laws or prohibitive costs. Alaska cannot afford to repeat these mistakes, especially considering our socioeconomic dependence on fish and wildlife.

In Alaska, we have a unique opportunity to protect our rivers and lakes before they reach such a critical state. However, our ability to do so is hampered by a lack of adequate hydrological and biological data. With only one stream gage per 6,000 to 7,000 square miles—compared to one gage per 400 square miles in the Lower 48—our understanding of water availability and the potential impacts of withdrawals on fish and wildlife is severely limited. This data deficiency makes it challenging for water users and managers alike to project the reliability and quantity of available water, even in the absence of competition. Accurate flow data is also crucial for managing and enforcing existing water rights, which further underscores the importance of maintaining strong protections for instream flows.

The Susitna River, a critical artery for Southcentral Alaska, has been the subject of numerous studies on flow changes, particularly during discussions of the proposed Watana Dam. These studies revealed the potentially devastating effects of altering natural flows, not just for fish species like salmon—keystone to Alaska's ecosystem and economy—but for the entire riverine ecosystem. The lessons we learned from these studies reaffirm the need to protect natural river

flows and ensure that water use decisions in Alaska prioritize long-term ecological sustainability over short-term industrial gains.

The current process for obtaining instream water reservations is already rigorous, with applicants required to provide scientific data to support the need for protection. Further complicating this process by imposing additional barriers or restricting public participation would deter individuals, communities, and organizations—like SRC—from safeguarding the waters they depend on. This would directly undermine Alaska's Constitution, which prioritizes water use for fish, wildlife, and public purposes. Any changes that limit public access to the water reservation process or add undue burdens to applicants would weaken protections that are critical to maintaining healthy ecosystems and thriving communities.

Instead of creating new obstacles, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) should focus on improving the efficiency of the water reservation process and prioritizing the adjudication of existing applications. The backlog of unprocessed applications highlights the need for timely action, particularly as pressures from industrial development and water-intensive industries continue to grow. At the same time, increased funding for hydrological and biological data collection is crucial to ensure that decisions are made with accurate, up-to-date information about Alaska's water resources.

In conclusion, the Susitna River Coalition urges DNR to preserve and strengthen protections for instream water reservations. To improve Alaska's water reservation system and ensure the continued protection of our vital waterways, we recommend the following actions:

- 1. **Increase funding for hydrological and biological data collection** to better understand water availability and the potential impacts of withdrawals on fish and wildlife.
- 2. Streamline the administrative process for obtaining a water reservation, making it more accessible and efficient for communities and organizations to protect their water resources.
- 3. **Increase public education about the importance of water reservations**, ensuring Alaskans are aware of how these protections safeguard our ecosystems and water-dependent livelihoods.
- 4. **Develop a comprehensive water use plan for the state**, prioritizing sustainable management of water resources to meet the needs of ecosystems, communities, and industries alike.

By adopting these measures, Alaska can maintain its constitutional commitment to protecting fish, wildlife, and the public interest while ensuring a more resilient and effective water management system. We believe Alaska has the opportunity to set a national example in responsible water stewardship, ensuring that our rivers continue to support healthy communities, thriving economies, and vibrant ecosystems for generations to come.

Thank you also for extending the public comment period on this important issue. Water management is a specifically important function of state government considering what are often numerous competing uses for our waterbodies. Our world class fisheries rely on adequate water supply, which has led to numerous applications for instream flow applications across the state. This is a critical tool to protect and perpetuate our commercial, sport and subsistence fisheries, and DNR should consider ways to streamline the process for groups and individuals to secure instream flow reservations. Alaska statute and regulation clearly allows for citizens, groups, and Tribes to apply for an instream flow reservation to protect fish in a geographically limited area from depletion of water by large industrial, agricultural or other projects. Any changes that DNR proposes to the water use regulation regarding instream flow must comply with AS 46.15.145 "The state, an agency or a political subdivision of the state, an agency of the United States or a person may apply to the commissioner to reserve sufficient water to maintain a specified instream flow or level of water at a specified point on a stream or body of water, or in a specified part of a stream, throughout a year or for specified times..." Any regulatory change should closely track the intent of the statute. These applications are expensive for a nongovernmental entity to pursue, hence very few have ultimately been approved by DNR. Hydrologic gauge sites are upward of \$100,000 per year to maintain and are often in remote locations. DNR requires a minimum of five years of data in a water reservation application. The cost element, as well as the amount of time it takes to record all the data required for a successful application has proven to be a deterrent to those groups, individuals and Tribes that might otherwise seek to protect critical water resources. On the other hand, a Temporary Water Use Authorization is a system that allows applicants to pay a minimal fee and provide relatively little information on the habitat impacts of the intended water use. These water use authorizations can be applied for a period of up to five consecutive years, and a single application is sufficient to apply to five separate water sources for water withdrawals, diversions, impoundments and other uses presumably some of which would have a direct or indirect impact on fish habitat. The current backlog of instream flow reservation applications at DNR indicates a need for a more efficient process. Instead of moving forward on any regulation that makes it harder for Alaskans to protect fish, the state should mandate the reservation of sufficient instream water levels for the protection of fish and have a permitting process that puts the onus on applicants for competing water uses to design projects that protect our state's fish populations. It appears from the prompts provided by DNR in this regulation scoping review project that the primary focus of any regulation change will be to modify the water reservation regulation. Please use caution on any regulation change that further restricts Alaskans from making and holding instream flow reservation protections and

Dear Mr. Barrett,

On behalf of the undersigned entities, including Trout Unlimited (TU), Katmai Service Providers (KSP), and 15 additional Alaska businesses and organizations, please accept these comments on possible updates and revisions to the Alaska Department of Natural Resources (DNR) water management regulations, 11 AAC 93.

This public scoping is the latest in a long string of proposed or enacted regulatory changes that improperly tip the scales in favor of industrial water uses at the expense of existing and future reservations of water. We have serious concerns about potential changes the DNR may be considering and what these changes could mean for Alaska's rivers, streams and lakes, our fisheries, and the many businesses and individuals that rely on our waters for their livelihoods, for recreation, and for their cultural and subsistence values.

Trout Unlimited is the nation's largest sporting organization dedicated to coldwater conservation, with 20,000 Alaskan supporters that are passionate anglers, lodge and outfitting business owners, fishing and hunting guides, subsistence users, commercial fishers, and Alaskans from a variety of walks of life. In addition to our members in more remote parts of the state, TU has active chapters in Fairbanks, Anchorage and the Mat-Su, on the Kenai

Peninsula, and in Southeast Alaska. Trout Unlimited members rely on Alaska's waters—and the fish and wildlife that inhabit them—for fishing, hunting, subsistence, outdoor recreation, and for employment in related industries. On behalf of its members and to help ensure its members' instream uses of water can continue into the future, TU has submitted numerous applications to the DNR for instream flow reservations, participated in various adjudications, engaged in numerous 10-year reviews of instream flow reservations, and incurred significant costs associated with those activities and applications.

Katmai Service Providers is an association of 60 recreation and tourism businesses that operate in and around Katmai National Park. The organization is dedicated to resource stewardship, promoting public access, and fostering cooperation and communication among users of the Katmai National Park and government agencies. Its members include fishing and hunting lodges, bear viewing outfitters, flying services, and tour operators. All members of Katmai Service Providers have deep and personal economic ties to the waters of Katmai National Park and the many rivers, streams and lakes in the broader Bristol Bay region. They are committed to conserving the region's unique fish, wildlife and water resources, which are essential to the region's long-term economic health. Katmai Service Providers' members regularly operate their businesses on and around waters subject to instream flow reservations and rely on reservations to provide assurance that adequate instream flow will remain in those waters to support the fish and game, recreation, and navigation necessary for their businesses to prosper.

Collectively, the undersigned entities represent more than 100 Alaska-based businesses, including fishing and outfitting guides, lodges and air taxi services, and seafood businesses. Each of these businesses relies on instream flow and instream uses of water. Some of these businesses operate where reservations of water already exist, such as on the Kenai River. However, because the State of Alaska's efforts to secure reservations have lagged behind demand, many others operate where no reservation exists. Because of the significant cost and time required to secure a reservation of water, many of these businesses look to organizations like Trout Unlimited to represent their interests and seek reservations on their behalf. Just as a person can appropriate water for their own diversionary or other out-of-stream beneficial use, these businesses need the ability to appropriate water through a reservation for their own instream use.

I. Background

Alaska's waters, and the iconic fish and wildlife populations supported by them, are essential to the Alaskan way of life and Alaskans' economic well-being. Our collective business members and supporters live or operate in Alaska because of the many benefits afforded to them from healthy fish and wildlife populations, abundant outdoor recreation opportunity, and because of Alaska's relatively clean water and healthy environment—all of which is made possible by natural instream flow. Our members enjoy fishing, hunting and recreating on their time off, many earn their living from those same resources, and we work with our children and

younger members to help ensure this lifestyle continues into the future. This lifestyle, which is available to all Alaskans, depends on healthy and intact watersheds, unaltered streamflow, and natural water quality and quantity.

As increased population and development has taken place over the past decades, maintaining natural stream flow and water quality in our public waters has become increasingly important, and will only become more important in the future. Establishing and maintaining instream flow reservations for these important waterways helps serve the critical public interest by providing a guarantee for our important fish, wildlife and water resources, ensuring a foundation for our fish and water-based businesses, and by helping to ensure the Alaskan way of life remains available into the future.

By observing the plight of salmon in the Pacific Northwest, with many salmon stocks already extinct and many more a mere fraction of their historic abundance, it is important to understand the risks to Alaska's salmon from a "death by a thousand cuts." This risk, regrettably, is already manifesting itself in Alaska where nearly all our Chinook salmon populations and many coho salmon stocks are well below historic abundance, and no longer support once thriving commercial, sport or subsistence fishing opportunity. While any individual water body may seem inconsequential at first blush, a deeper inspection reveals the exceptional value of our salmon habitat and that *every* stream and river can have an impact on our important fisheries. Alaskans often tout, and rightly so, how our fisheries are sustainable and how they can continue to produce jobs, income and a healthy source of food indefinitely. However, this claim remains true only so long as we take care of our fisheries and fish habitat, and take measures to ensure adequate stream flow remains in our important rivers and streams.

Allowing and encouraging instream flow reservations has overwhelmingly positive benefits for Alaskans. Instream flow reservations help ensure natural stream flow, protect water quality and water quantity, and provide security for local sport and commercial fisheries, while also protecting the immeasurably important subsistence fisheries for local communities. Recreation, public health, our Alaskan way of life, and our economic wellbeing are all best served by encouraging instream flow reservations and allowing non-governmental entities like TU, KSP and others to pursue, obtain, and hold certificates for reservations of water. Maintaining the natural stream flow regime and water quality of Alaska's many rivers, streams and lakes often is their highest and most beneficial use.

From the Bristol Bay region to the Arctic and to Southeast Alaska, and in all parts in between, Alaska's world-class fisheries are the foundation for our communities, cultures and economy. Commercial salmon fishing accounts for roughly 38,000 jobs and \$5 billion in annual economic contribution. When sport fishing is included, total employment tops 43,000. In the Bristol Bay region, where KSP's members operate and where most of TU's applications for reservations of water for instream flow are located, more than 50 million sockeye salmon can return annually thanks to the region's diverse and numerous free-flowing waterways, with

recent years accounting for the largest runs in decades. Southcentral Alaska's numerous rivers, streams and lakes—including the world-famous Kenai River—produce some of the state's best and most accessible recreational, personal-use and subsistence fisheries. Southeast Alaska's waters, which include hundreds of individual salmon streams, support rural communities and tourism opportunities unlike anywhere else in the world. Other regions of Alaska support rural communities, remote tourism businesses, and unique instream uses that exist seemingly nowhere else in the world. Together, Alaska's many waterways produce huge annual salmon returns and exceptional recreation and commercial opportunity that contribute to the entire state's economy.

Anglers, hunters, and outdoor recreationists travel from across the globe to visit Alaska's free-flowing waters for their trophy fish and game, their remote scenery, and their wild character. Native Alaskans have relied on the bounty of Alaska's waters for many thousands of years to sustain their traditional and customary way of life. Generations of families have fished commercially in Alaska, and numerous businesses, both large and small, have carved out niches capitalizing on Alaska's rivers and streams.

Maintaining instream flow is essential to Alaska, its people, and its economy. Our robust fish-based economy and unique fish-based cultures would not exist but for Alaska's many clean, naturally-flowing rivers and streams that provide some of the best spawning, rearing and migration habitat for wild salmon and resident fishes in the world. Decisions about how public waters are allocated, reserved, or otherwise appropriated are of utmost importance—and priority should be given to those beneficial uses that utilize instream flow.

II. Alaska's Constitution Guarantees the Right to the Common Use and Appropriation of Public Waters.

Multiple provisions of our Alaska Constitution and state law make clear that individuals and other non-government entities can apply for and receive certificates for reservations of instream flow. "Whenever occurring in their natural state, fish, wildlife and waters are reserved to the people for common use." Art. VIII § 3.

All surface and subsurface waters reserved to the people for common use, except mineral and medicinal waters, are subject to appropriation. Priority of appropriation shall give prior right. Except for public water supply, an appropriation of water shall be limited to stated purposes and subject to preferences among beneficial uses, concurrent or otherwise, as prescribed by law, and to the general reservation of fish and wildlife.

Art. VIII § 13.

State law elaborates on these rights by defining "appropriate" to mean "to divert, impound, or withdraw a quantity of water from a source of water, for a beneficial use *or to reserve water* under AS 46.15.145." AS 46.15.260(1) (emphasis added). Similarly,

"appropriation" is defined to mean "the diversion, impounding, or withdrawal of a quantity of water from a source of water for a beneficial use *or the reservation of water* under AS 46.15.145." AS 46.15.260(2) (emphasis added). While competing appropriations are differentiated by priority date and by preferences among beneficial uses, no distinction or hierarchy is made among the various types of appropriations—whether a diversion, impoundment, withdrawal or reservation. Any person, which is broadly defined in law to include individuals and organizations like TU and KSP, "may apply to the commissioner to reserve sufficient water to maintain a specified instream flow or level of water" for "(1) protection of fish and wildlife habitat, migration, and propagation; (2) recreation and park purposes; (3) navigation and transportation purposes; and (4) sanitary and water quality purposes." AS 46.15.145(a); see AS 46.15.260(7).

The only reasonable interpretation of these constitutional provisions and statutes is that, subject to prior rights and preferences among beneficial uses, individuals and non-governmental entities have the right to appropriate water, which includes the right to reserve water. Individuals and non-governmental entities don't just have the right to apply for an appropriation; they have the constitutionally-guaranteed right to actually appropriate the water themselves.

State law provides that the commissioner shall issue a certificate if the commissioner finds the rights of any prior appropriators will not be affected, the applicant has demonstrated a need, there is unappropriated water sufficient for the reservation, and the reservation is in the public interest. AS 46.15.145(b). In evaluating the public interest, the Commissioner must consider:

- (1) the benefit to the applicant . . . ; (2) the effect of the economic activity . . . ;
- (3) the effect on fish and game resources and on public recreation opportunities;
- (4) the effect on public health; (5) the effect of loss of alternate uses of water that might be made within a reasonable time if not precluded or hindered by the proposed appropriation; (6) harm to other persons resulting from the proposed appropriation; (7) the intent and ability of the applicant to complete the appropriation; and (8) the effect upon access to navigable or public water.

AS 46.15.080(b); 11 AAC 93.970(13).

Although the DNR has not specified what changes it is considering to the water management regulations, if the changes are anything like what the DNR proposed in the past, the changes would be a significant departure from the DNR's past practice and conflict with the Alaska Constitution and Statutes. These changes, in combination with the DNR's long-standing failure to adjudicate applications for reservations and other instream uses, improperly elevates out-of-stream beneficial uses above instream beneficial uses when no such distinction exists in state law. While the constitution and statutes allow for preference among beneficial uses, that preference must be formed when there are competing uses, considering the priority of the

competing uses, the comparative benefit from each competing use, impacts to affected waters, and the public interest:

When there are competing applications for water from the same source, and the source is insufficient to supply all applicants, the commissioner shall give preference first to the public water supply and then to the use that alone or in combination with other foreseeable uses will constitute the most beneficial use."

AS 46.15.090. Additionally, Alaska law defines "beneficial use" as:

a use of water for the benefit of the appropriator, other persons or the public, that is reasonable and consistent with the public interest, including, but not limited to, domestic, agricultural, irrigation, industrial, manufacturing, fish and shellfish processing, navigation and transportation, mining, power, public, sanitary, fish and wildlife, recreational uses, and maintenance of water quality.

AS 46.15.260(3). Instream and out-of-stream beneficial uses are scattered throughout this definition and in no particular order. Some of the specified beneficial uses—such as fish and shellfish processing, power, maintenance of water quality, and possibly others—can utilize reservations for instream flow *or* withdrawals out of the water body. Similarly, the definitions for the terms "appropriate" and "appropriation" include instream flow reservations along with diversions, impoundments, or withdrawals—without elevating any particular category of use above another. Yet, the DNR often takes many, many years to review and adjudicate applications for instream flow reservations. Trout Unlimited, for example, has numerous complete applications for instream flow reservations it submitted to the DNR nearly 20 years ago that the DNR has yet to review or adjudicate. Relegating reservations of instream flow to be a second-class beneficial use—whether through overt regulatory changes or through unnecessary delays in adjudication—contravenes the Alaska Constitution and statutes, and has no basis in law. Just as any person can apply for and obtain a certificate for a beneficial use that relies on diverting, impounding, or withdrawing water, the DNR's regulations must allow a person to apply for, obtain and hold a certificate for a reservation of instream flow.

III. Regulatory Changes Threaten to Strain Agency Budgets to the Breaking Point.

Various individuals and non-governmental entities, including TU, have invested significant financial and technical resources toward instream flow reservations. Trout Unlimited alone has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars collecting stream flow data, fisheries and wildlife data, and other information about the public's use of Alaska waters to support its applications for instream flow reservations. While much of this data and expense is beyond what should be necessary for the DNR to review TU's individual applications, the data and expenses improve our understanding of the benefits of instream flow and could be important if the DNR receives a competing application for water from the same water body.

When faced with competing uses and insufficient water quantity to supply those competing uses, data on stream flow, fish and wildlife, water quality, and hydrology become helpful to evaluating the comparative benefits from, and public interest in, competing potential uses. Under the current regulations, applicants like TU frequently bear that financial burden. If these regulations change and non-governmental entities are no longer allowed to pursue or hold reservations of water, the change will disincentivize applications for instream flow reservations, the DNR and Alaska Department of Fish and Game's (ADFG) will bear significant increased responsibility for instream flow reservations—and our already strained state budgets will be stretched even thinner with the additional costs of stream gauging, fish and wildlife studies, hydrologic analysis, and countless other studies.

IV. Additional Specific Comments:

- <u>11 AAC 93.141</u>: The DNR should not change any provision of this regulation. However, if the DNR proposes any change, the change should expand and encourage the ability of the public to apply for, obtain, and hold a certificate for reservation of water.
- 11 AAC 93.142: The DNR previously proposed adding "purported" to this regulation, which would make it inconsistent with regulations for other types of water rights, which merely require the applicant to provide "a statement of beneficial use." See 11 AAC 93.040. The Alaska Constitution and state law make clear that any person can appropriate water for a variety of beneficial uses, several of which rely on reservations for instream flow. The previously proposed change introduces bias against beneficial uses that rely on instream flow that has no basis in state law or our Alaska Constitution. The DNR also previously proposed adding "applicable" to this regulation, which would introduce ambiguity where none previously existed. This change is unnecessary, will invite unneeded litigation, and serves no valid purpose.

Since a reservation of water does not require a diversion or withdrawal and, instead, remains in the stream for the benefit of fish and wildlife, the DNR's regulations should allow applications for instream flow reservations that are based on the best available information even if that information does not fully quantify the total volume of water available throughout the year. Additionally, if there are no competing applications for water use, the DNR should allow for a streamlined process for approving applications for reservations of water.

- 11 AAC 93.145: The DNR should adjudicate applications for water rights, regardless of whether the proposed beneficial use is for diversionary use or a reservation for instream use, in the order the applications are received.
- <u>11 AAC 93.146(b)</u>: In the DNR's March 16, 2021, response to questions regarding previously-proposed regulatory changes, the DNR seems to argue that withholding certificates for reservations from individuals and non-governmental entities will "avoid any potential interference that a private interest holds a private, exclusive management

authority over public water" and that reservations can only serve public purpose and not any individual applicant's purpose. Both arguments are flawed and unlawful. As discussed above, the Alaska Constitution and state law make clear that any person, which is defined to include non-governmental entities like TU and KSP, may appropriate public waters, which is defined to include reservations of water. See Art. VIII § 13; AS 46.15.260(1) and (7). Like all appropriations, reservations are subject to prior rights and preferences among beneficial uses—and under no circumstance does an appropriator gain "a private, exclusive management authority over public water." The State of Alaska always has management authority over water use, regardless of what type of beneficial use is served by the certificate. Additionally, reservations serve public and private interests. Trout Unlimited's and KSP's members all use public waters for their own individual purposes, which when combined with the use by other Alaskans is a public interest. All appropriations—regardless of whether the appropriation is a reservation for fish and wildlife, a withdrawal for a mining operation, an impoundment for a power generation facility, or any other use—must serve a beneficial use that is in the public interest. An outfitter that guides clients down a river, a commercial fishermen that harvests salmon, a barge or water taxi operator that delivers goods along a river, and countless other Alaska businesses all rely on instream flow for their individual economic livelihood, in addition to the broader public interests served by instream flow reservations.

In the DNR's April 1, 2021, response to questions regarding previously-proposed regulatory changes, the DNR indicated that it will require federally recognized Tribes to waive sovereign immunity to obtain a reservation of water. No provision of Alaska statutes or regulations impose such a requirement. Such a requirement is unlawful and the State of Alaska has no authority to require a sovereign immunity waiver in this context.

- 11 AAC 93.146(e): The DNR previously proposed changes that would have stripped pending applications for reservations of their priority, regardless of how long ago they were filed. Such a change would violate the Alaska Constitution and state law. More than a decade has passed since TU submitted several of its applications for reservations of water. Despite this, the DNR has failed to adjudicate any of TU's applications, has not granted a single certificate for any reservation sought by TU, and has shown no sign it is about to act. Unless the DNR adjudicates and certifies all applications in the order they are received, regardless of whether the application is for a reservation or other beneficial use, the DNR must give priority according to the date the application was received, regardless of whether the DNR has issued a certificate for the application.
- <u>11 AAC 93.147(b) and (e)</u>: The DNR previously proposed changes to this section that would be unlawful. Alaska law makes clear that only a single purpose is needed for a reservation of instream flow. Additionally, because reservations are subject to periodic review and possibly modification on 10-year intervals, *see* AS 46.15.145(f), Alaska law makes clear that the need justifying the reservation may change over time.

V. Specific Comments on Other Sections:

In order for the DNR to make informed decisions regarding the public interest and manage our state's waters in a way that protects our valuable fisheries, any changes to Alaska's water management regulations should require public notice and the opportunity for public input, along with consultation with the ADFG, even in instances where the proposed water use is temporary. Ensuring adequate water quality and quantity in our state's fish-producing waters to maintain our thriving fisheries is of utmost importance to Alaskans. We urge the DNR to end its opaque decision making and, if it adopts any changes to its water management regulations, to adopt changes that provide for public notice and participation, and that require the DNR to consult with the ADFG to ensure water-use decisions do not threaten the productivity and viability of our world-class fisheries:

- <u>11 AAC 93.040</u>: Any application for an out-of-stream water right must require review by the ADFG to ensure minimum water quantity and quality remains in-stream to support fish and wildlife spawning, rearing and migration.
- 11 AAC 93.120: If the DNR undertakes any changes to its water use regulations, the DNR should adopt regulations that require it to review applications in the order they are received and to issue a decision rejecting or approving any application within three years in order to ensure the application is processed in a timely manner and not, in effect, stayed indefinitely. Additionally, temporary uses of water should apply only where there also is no prior unadjudicated application for appropriation, including a prior unadjudicated application to reserve water. Because it is impossible for the DNR to evaluate whether a temporary use of water may adversely affect a prior unadjudicated application for that same water, and the Alaska Constitution give priority to prior right, the DNR cannot lawfully authorize the temporary use of water where a prior unadjudicated application, including for instream uses, exists.
- 11 AAC 93.220: The DNR should additionally change its regulations to require public notice and opportunity for comment before authorizing any temporary water use. If a proposed temporary water use may affect water subject to a prior application for appropriation, including for instream uses, and DNR should provide notice to that prior applicant, an opportunity for comment, and an opportunity for a hearing. The DNR should also consult with the ADFG to ensure sufficient water quality and quantity remains to support fish and wildlife spawning, rearing and migration. The Alaska Constitution guarantees the right to appropriate water for beneficial uses, including instream uses, and it would violate the Alaska Constitution for the DNR to authorize a temporary water use that uses water reserved for instream flow.
- 11 AAC 93.510: The DNR should seek more transparent and open decision making, allow more public input, and avail itself of outside expertise that may allow the DNR to arrive at a more informed decision that better meets the public's need. Any holder of a

certificate for an instream flow reservation and any applicant for an instream flow reservation should have the same rights and responsibilities as a certificate holder or applicant for a withdrawal, impoundment, or diversion.

- <u>11 AAC 93.530</u>: Regulations should encourage broad public notice and participation by continuing to require the DNR to publish notice in a newspaper of general circulation. Additionally, notice should be mailed to applicants and not just appropriators since the DNR often takes many, many years to adjudicate applications.
- 11 AAC 93.970(25): Because the DNR often takes many years to adjudicate applications and does not adjudicate applications according to the date they are received, the DNR must afford applicants of instream flow reservations the same priority and rights as certificate holders.

VI. Conclusion.

Most challenges related to reservations of water in Alaska are the result of the DNR's administration of existing laws and regulations—not because the existing regulations or laws need to be changed. We strongly encourage the DNR to reject changing its regulations for reservations of water. We urge the DNR to reconsider, to help preserve our Alaskan way of life, protect our economic interests in fish and wildlife, and help safeguard the irreplaceable cultural values of fish, wildlife and water resources by encouraging, rather than eroding, public participation in the pursuit of instream flow reservations. Fish and wildlife, and the habitat they rely on, are central to Alaskans' way of life and our economic, cultural and spiritual wellbeing. Non-governmental organizations, Tribes, individuals, and businesses all play a key role in ensuring adequate water and instream flow to keep these important resources thriving. It is critical that the DNR manage public waters in a way that ensures the continued productivity of important fish and wildlife habitat.

According to Alaska's constitution "Wherever occurring in their natural state, fish, wildlife, and waters are reserved to the people for common use." In order to bring DNR's regulations inline with the constitution DNR should update the regulations to implement a system that reserves a baseline amount of water necessary for fish, wildlife and common public uses by the people of Alaska consistent with the requirements of Article VIII of the Alaska Constitution. A standard baseline reservation system will eliminate the backlog of reservations of water needing to be adjudicated and guard against the over appropriation of water. Given the fact that ADF&G is responsible for the protection of Fish and Wildlife resources, this baseline system should be implemented by both agencies and applications to appropriate water out of Alaskan water bodies for large-scale industrial use should also be adjudicated by both ADF&G and DNR. Thank you for working to improve this system and working to bring it in line with Alaska's constitution.

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

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) thanks the Alaska Department of Natural Resources (ADNR) for the opportunity to provide comments in the 1 August 2024 Notice for Public Scoping for possible regulation changes to Alaska's Reservations of Water program. Please see the attached comments from the Service. Please confirm the receipt of the Service's comments.

The Service also informs ADNR that we observed, as of 12:52pm on 29 October 2024 (see screen shot image below) that ADNR's Division of Mining, Land and Water comment portal website indicated the comment period for the scoping process closed on 30 August 2024 and the comment portal was not accessible for comment submission. ADNR extended the comment period deadline to 29 October 2024 (see ADNR's extension supplemental notice that is attached). Stakeholders are directed to comment to ADNR through the comment portal, through mail, or by email. On 29 October 2024, the comment portal was not accessible for submitting comments prior to the Service notifying ADNR about the problem through direct email. The Service commends ADNR for quickly resolving the issue. However, since this issue was resolved on the final day of the comment period, ADNR should consider determining how much of the comment period the comment portal was not available and displayed incorrect deadline information. If this has been an ongoing issue since 30 August 2024, ADNR should be aware that stakeholder involvement in this scoping process may have been deterred.

This letter provides input requested in the 1 August 2024 Notice for Public Scoping for possible regulation changes to Title 11 AAC 93 implementing Reservations of Water (AS 46.15.145). The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) thanks the Alaska Department of Natural Resources (ADNR) for the opportunity to provide comments during this scoping process.

The United States Congress reserved new or expanded existing National Wildlife Refuges (Refuges) when it passed the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) of 1980. Title III of ANILCA mandates that the Service ensure water of sufficient quality and quantity for populations and habitats of fish and wildlife as a purpose of every Refuge in Alaska [P.L. 96-487, 94 Stat. 2371 (1980)]. All Refuges in Alaska maintain unquantified federal reserved water rights to meet these mandates. The Service's policy (403 FW1) regarding protection of its water rights is as follows:

"It is the Service's policy to comply with State laws, regulations, and procedures in obtaining and protecting water rights, both for Service facilities and for trust fish and wildlife resources on lands not owned by the United States, except where application of State statutes and regulations does not permit Federal purposes to be achieved. Federal reserved water rights will be quantified and asserted when necessary to accomplish the primary purpose of the reservation. Water rights shall be purchased if essential to Service activities and not otherwise available. . . . The Service shall cooperate with the States on all matters related to water use and water rights and will seek to resolve conflicts through negotiation, in coordination with the Solicitor's Office, as appropriate."

Consistent with this policy, the Service has worked within the State's water regulations to apply for reservations of water for instream flow purposes. The water reservation applications the Service has submitted to Alaska DNR are not a waiver of the rights of the United States under the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution, or of any other rights under Federal Law and in no way are intended to quantify, diminish, or otherwise affect any federal reserved water right claim.

The Service and the State of Alaska share a common interest in conserving and protecting fish and wildlife and their habitats. When properly administered, the unique characteristics of instream flow reservations in Title 11 of the Alaska Administrative Code enhances these common conservation and protection interests. The current regulations in Title 11 of the Alaska Administrative Code implementing AS 46.15.145 Reservations of Water are clear, comprehensive, and effective. Any revisions to Title 11 AAC 93 should support the continued protection of water for fish and wildlife habitats and populations.

The Service has invested significant resources on the collection, analysis, and maintenance of data that support State based reservations of water for instream flows. Changes to Title 11 AAC 93 implementing Reservations of Water (AS 46.15.145) are of interest and potentially concern to the Service. Collaboration with ADNR in the water reservation system is critical in fulfilling the purposes of Alaska's Refuges. The Service emphasizes our good-faith partnership with ADNR built on working within Alaska's water reservation system for decades. The Service has filed 203 applications for water reservations, with only one application being granted a "certificate of reservation" through ADNR's adjudication process. We currently maintain 202 unadjudicated applications with priority standing ranging back to 1994.

In the 1 August 2024 Notice of Public Scoping, ADNR specifically requested input for several sections of Title 11 AAC 93. The guiding questions ADNR asked in the public notice are listed below and followed by the Service's response.

"11 AAC 93.142 (Content of application)

- Should additional information be required to justify the need for a reservation of water?
- What types of data and methodology?"

Service response:

No changes are necessary to 11 AAC 93.142. The Alaska Water Use Act [AS 46.15.145(a)] clearly defines the purposes for a water reservation. Existing regulations require applicants to identify the purpose and "explain what need exists for the proposed reservation, including reasons why the reservation is being requested" [11 AAC 93.142(b)(3)]. The water reservation applications are highly rigorous, and requiring additional information is not necessary for applicants to justify the need for the purposes stated in a reservation of water application.

No changes are necessary to 11 AAC 93.142 regarding data and methodology. Existing regulations already require applicants to "identify and explain the methodology to be used to quantify the proposed reservation" [11 AAC 93.142 (6)]. The hydrological processes that drive surface water flow can be different across Alaska, and methods for data collection and analysis will vary to meet those conditions. Methodology may also vary based on the purpose of the reservation.

"11 AAC 93.146 (Issuance of a certificate of reservation of water)

- Should only State resource agencies, such as DNR or Alaska Department of Fish and Game, hold the certificate of a reservation of water?
- Who should hold a certificate of a reservation of water?"

Service response:

No changes are necessary to 11 AAC 93.146. The Water Use Act [AS 46.15.145 (a)] clearly defines "the state, an agency or a political subdivision of the state, an agency of the United States or a person may apply..." for an instream flow reservation. Current regulations state "The certificate of reservation will be issued to the applicant" [11 AAC 93.146 (b)], and honor the legislative intent of the Water Use Act. Certificate of reservations should continue to be granted to the applicant, similarly to consumptive water right certificates.

"11 AAC 93.147 (Review of a reservation of water) • Are the review requirements clear and adequate?"

Service response:

The review requirements are clear and adequate; no changes are necessary to 11 AAC 93.147. Existing regulations clearly describe the criteria that must be met when reviewing existing reservations and are consistent with the Water Use Act [AS 46.15.145 (f)].

Additional Scoping Comments and Questions:

- The Service has one overriding concern that ADNR should address during this scoping process: ADNR should ensure that if regulations implementing the water reservation program are changed, that ADNR will administer existing water reservations and unadjudicated applications by applying the regulations at the time the applications was filed.
- The Service's primary concern with the water reservation program is ADNR's failure to adjudicate water reservation applications in a timely manner. To date, ADNR has processed 178 out of 498 applications for reservations of water. One challenge in providing comments during this scoping process is that ADNR has not clearly conveyed how current water management regulations have resulted in the backlog of pending applications and other inefficiencies in administering Alaska's water reservation system.
- ADNR has not communicated a clear purpose or need for revisions to water reservation regulations.
- ADNR should first prioritize its limited resources to improving its capacity to properly apply the
 current regulations and adjudicate all pending water reservation applications before expending
 any more resources on possible regulatory changes.
- ADNR should hold the water reservation system on equal footing with consumptive water rights. The Water Use Act defines appropriation (AS 46.15.260) as "the diversion, impounding, or withdrawal of a quantity of water from a source of water for a beneficial use or the reservation of water under AS 46.15.145." Treating all water appropriations similarly will bring consistency and efficiency to ADNR's administration of water rights and benefit all stakeholders.
- ADNR should advocate for the re-establishment of the Alaska Water Resources Board. The Alaska Water Use Act created the Water Resources Board consisting of seven appointed members having "knowledge of the use and requirements for use of the water of the state and the conservation and protection of it." The responsibility of the Water Resources Board is to "advise the Governor on all matters relating to the use and appropriation of water in the state, including, but not limited to; (1) the effect and adequacy of state laws and regulations governing the establishment of water rights; (2) the multi-purpose uses of water; (3) the prevention of pollution and the protection of fish and game...". A Water Resource Board consisting of diverse stakeholders will inform ADNR of the adequacy of current water management regulations, and identify opportunities for efficient, consistent, and cost-effective" approaches in ADNR's water management administration.

On August 1, 2024, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR, Department) began a scoping process to ask the public for input on updating certain water management regulations in 11 AAC 93. The purpose of this supplemental notice is to extend the public comment period for an additional 60 days. The original public comment period was scheduled to run from August 1 to August 30, 2024. The new deadline for public comments is now 5:00 p.m. on October 29, 2024. As explained below, the Division of Mining, Land and Water (DMLW) has also added supplemental background materials to the scoping project website at https://dnr.alaska.gov/mlw/water/regrevision/.

The Department is considering updating the regulations implementing AS 46.15.145 Reservations of water: 11 AAC 93.141, 11 AAC 93.142 (Content of application), 11 AAC 93.143, 11 AAC 93.144, 11 AAC 93.145, Adjudication of applications 11 AAC 93.146 (Issuance of a certificate of reservation of water), and 11 AAC 93.147 (Review of a reservation of water).

The Department is undertaking this scoping process to ask the public for their ideas and suggestions before the Department undertakes the task of drafting any specific proposed regulations for public review. Written input must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on October 29, 2024. At such time DNR undertakes revisions to these regulations, there will be an additional timeframe to provide public comments on the proposed regulations.

Background Information

In January 2021, the Department publicly noticed proposed changes to a variety of water management regulations in 11 AAC 93. The Department received numerous comments on regulations concerning reservations of water and decided to advance only the administrative changes (adopted in June 2024). - Should only State resource agencies, such as DNR or Alaska Department of Fish and Game, hold the certificate of a reservation of water?
- Who should hold a certificate of a reservation of water?

11 AAC 93.147 (Review of a reservation of water)

Are the review requirements clear and adequate?

How will DNR use the information I provide?

The Department will carefully review all input, including responses to the above prompts, received during this scoping period. Information provided to the Department will be subject to inspection, copying, and distribution as public records under Alaska Statute 40.25.110 – 40.25.220. 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The Alaska Region US Forest Service is reviewing the current information regarding potential regulatory changes to Water Management (Reservations of Water). We are aware that this topic was last proposed by the Department of Natural Resources in 2021 and a lengthy public review process ensued. To Whom It May Concern;

The US Forest Service Alaska Region (USFS) is pleased to respond to Alaska Department of Natural Resources' (ADNR) solicitation for comments on potential regulatory revisions to 11 AAC 93.141 – 93.147. When the United States reserved National Forest lands, it also implicitly reserved sufficient water to satisfy the purposes for which those reservations were created (Winters v. United States, 207 U.S. 564). Reservations made by presidential executive order and those made by an act of Congress have implied federally reserved water rights. Adequate water quantity is critical to ensuring that the purpose of the forest reservation can be achieved and sustained into the future. These implied rights notwithstanding, the USFS has engaged in good faith with the state-based water rights system since the mid-1980s. Under this system, the USFS in the Alaska Region has acquired over 230 consumptive water rights and has approximately 51 pending applications for reservations of water across the Chugach and Tongass National Forests. Many of these have been prepared in collaboration with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADFG) to meet mutual aims and at considerable shared financial expense. It is important for us to continue this positive working relationship with the State of Alaska as this process is well understood and affords adequate resource protection when properly administered.

One challenge that the FS has in offering substantive comments to the purposed changes is that we are unsure what the rationale or impetus is for the purposed changes? Specifically, it is not clear what potential deficiencies in the current regulatory regime ADNR is attempting to address? Regulatory changes to the reservation of water program were first proposed in 2021, at which time many stakeholders—including the Forest Service—made clear our concerns about limiting the purpose and scope of the instream flow program. Alaska has a nationally enviable program whereby federal, state, non-governmental, and even private entities can hold reservations of water to satisfy what are inherently local needs. There are also many social, environmental, and economic benefits which accrue from adequate instream flows and the state should be an enthusiastic supporter of this program to achieve the "triple bottom" line." Informed, local decision-making and economic activity are outcomes we share with the State and hope to see encouraged through any future rule making by ADNR.

One guiding principle should continue to be treating reservations of water similarly to consumptive water rights. The legislative intent of the Alaska Water Use Act was made straightforward whereby any entity could apply and put the water to beneficial use. Instream flow reservations are simply a different type of water right whereby the benefits are still





demonstrated by the landowner (or their designee who shares mutual interest) and put to the highest and best use, consistent with the public interest, using local knowledge and data. Just as an irrigator may consume a quantity of water from a stream crossing their property to grow crops, the Forest Service holds instream water rights to protect fish for later harvest by sport and commercial fisherman or to support public recreation and subsistence.

Overall, we believe that the current regulations governing instream flow reservations are comprehensive and effective at serving the legislative intent for the multiple benefits this program provides. Our principal concern is simply with the slow rate of agency adjudication of these applications. Statewide, it appears that there are 498 applications awaiting adjudication and a paltry 1% of federal applications have been issued certificates. Of these pending applications, five are on the Chugach National Forest and forty-six are on the Tongass National Forest, with some unadjudicated applications going as far back as 1995. Across our lands, nearly all the applications were submitted by ADFG using standard data collection and analysis methodologies sufficient to meet the purpose and documented need. Most are classified as complete but nonetheless remained unadjudicated with no subsequent explanation provided. This is a remarkable delay, particularly in light of how much time, money, and staff investments have been made by or with ADFG as our valuable partner. We believe that ADNR should instead focus on clearing this backlog before future regulatory changes are considered.

11 AAC 93.142 (Content of application)

• Should additional information be required to justify the need for a reservation of water?

USFS Response: The current requirements in 11 AAC 93.142(b) are clear and comprehensive. Since AS § 46.15.145 provides a list of allowable purposes (fish and wildlife habitat, recreation, navigation, and water quality), a related list of acceptable needs could be developed so as to remove any ambiguity in the application. In a period with rapidly fluctuating climate conditions, protection of instream flows for these four purposes satisfies the broadest range of public interests more than narrower claims by industry or other applicants with more limited benefits.

• What types of data and methodology?

USFS Response: 11 AAC 93.142 does not specify a standard methodology. However, the State of Alaska instream flow handbook (DNR 1985) and Instream flow protection in Alaska (ADFG 2022) provide robust, repeatable, and defensible methodologies that we often follow. If there is a desire to standardize these methods, we could support such an amendment but hope that it also wouldn't be too onerous for applicants with fewer resources to conduct. Collecting continuous or even monthly flow data in remote parts of the state can be time consuming and expensive. A standard should be representative of the key periods of the hydrograph which are closely tied to the beneficial use purpose. For example, only low flows are needed to inform adequate spawning depths for fish whereas high flows are of greatest interest to whitewater recreationalists. By contrast, a full annual hydrograph is needed to quantify total water yield if the beneficial us is for municipal supply or hydropower generation. Tying the timing and intensity of data collection could be streamlined to target the stated purpose of the reservation and minimize unnecessary expense for applicants.

11 AAC 93.146 (Issuance of a certificate of reservation of water)

• Should only State resource agencies, such as DNR or Alaska Department of Fish and Game, hold the certificate of a reservation of water?

USFS Response: A plain language reading of AS § 46.15.145 makes it clear that the state, a state agency, a federal agency, or a person may apply for reservations of water. The language used throughout that section is that of an "applicant" submitting an "application." The application is for a "certificate" reserving water. The proposed approach would sever the connection between the applicant and the certificate applied for, reducing applicants to mere sponsors or advocates. Such an approach seems unjustified by the statutory language and contrary to legislative intent. Further, the current regulatory approach makes sense by best aligning resources and interests. NGOs, Federal agencies and property owners are committed to the reach of stream from which they personally derive the instream flow benefit and can be expected to continue upholding the water right.

Additionally, the Forest Service as well as other Federal agencies, already hold reserved water rights. See e.g., *Winters v. United States*, 207 U.S. 564. When the National Forests were created, the Supreme Court held that the Federal government also reserved sufficient water to satisfy the purposes for which those reservations were created. Since agencies of the United States already hold reserved water rights, there is no practical or legal reason to preclude such agencies from doing so pursuant to the AS § 46.15.145 process.

However, we can envision valid reasons for a water board or other entity *co-holding* reservations for individuals or NGOs who may not always have the longevity or administrative capacity of an agency. Dual issuances could provide stability and certainty for water users, could reduce conflict when it arises, and facilitate long-term planning in a watershed. A state agency could also help non-governmental certificate holders more easily demonstrate that the beneficial use is still being met using the process defined in AS § 46.15.145(f).

11 AAC 93.147 (Review of a reservation of water)

• *Are the review requirements clear and adequate?*

USFS Response: The 10-year review (AS § 46.15.145(f)) process seems irrelevant for claims which remain unadjudicated. It is unreasonable to require updated data collection when ADNR has not ruled on the sufficiency of the original information. Asking applicants to reinitiate data collection or analysis is an unreasonable burden beyond the standard defined in 11 AAC 93.142. Further, it is unclear whether there is an opportunity for an appeal if a revocation of an adjudicated right occurs.

I am a 56 year Alaska resident, the matriarch of a large Alaskan family, a former commercial and subsistence fisherman, a former educator and have owned a fisheries consulting business since 1991. Throughout my career I have served on numerous fisheries policy, regulatory and research committees and boards, both federal and state. I have worked specifically on salmon decline issues within the AYK since 2014. I currently chair the Fisheries Subcommittee of the Fairbanks Fish and Game Advisory Committee and I facilitate a weekly coalition meeting of representatives from the entire AYK, Bristol Bay, Chignik and other regions.

Water regulations and monitoring are complicated but fisheries management, across multiple jurisdictions, is far more complicated. Because of the crisis, not only in the AYK but statewide, in declining abundance and average size in all our wild salmon stocks, it is absolutely critical that we apply the maximum protections for anadromous fish passage and spawning and rearing habitat. This means applying the Sustainable Salmon Policy and Precautionary Measures practices, many of which are specific to water management.

With increasing mining activity in Alaska, now is the time to make water use regulations more stringent and to work with mining companies to ensure that they are following the most up to date methods for the assurance of water quality standards, fish friendly passage standards, culvert standards and monitoring and so much more. Water temperature and levels are intrinsic to this need.

Comments on AK DNR reservation of water program public scoping to identify if changes are needed to 11 AAC 93 of the Alaska Water Use Act (AS 46.145)

I've been an Alaska resident since 1987; a recreational boater; a river management professional since 1985; and a long-time contractor to federal, state, local agencies, utilities, and NGOs in Alaska and the Lower 48 focusing on instream flow and water level conservation, including navigability, and recreation planning issues.

I understand the DNR is considering a review of its water reservation program and regulations (hereafter labeled *water reservations*). As an avid boater and river management professional with nearly 40 years of experience conducting studies and assisting agencies with land and water recreation management and access planning, I offer the following comments on Alaska's unique water reservation statue (AS 46.15.145), its companion regulations (11AAC 93), and the corresponding program under review as part of this scoping process. My comments are organized under four topics below.

Clear explanations of the reasons for this scoping process and how it will be used

I'm curious about the timing and purpose of DNR's review of the water reservation program. I have no idea how many reservations have been granted on the out-of-stream side over the years, but I'm aware that instream reservations have been granted at a fairly glacial pace. I've also had concerns about the DNR 10-year review process; I provided previous comments supporting extension of the Talkeetna River water reservation as part of the DNR 10-year review process, but never heard about the outcome.

I suspect that there may be ways to improve the program's efficiencies or considerations for granting water reservations, particularly if those changes apply to both instream and out-of-stream appropriations equitably. There is certainly no cause to speed up industry-based appropriations of water for withdrawals, diversions, and impoundments without due consideration for (or balancing those uses with) protections for instream water.

I hope to learn concise explanations of the problems DNR is having with its current application/review/ reservation processes, regardless of whether they are for instream or out-of-stream purposes. Clarity about why DNR has chosen to conduct this scoping review, whether there will be a report on its conclusions, and proposed next steps and timelines could help us understand the problems the agency is trying to solve.

Support for water reservation applications from federal, state, local, or NGO organizations

I have concerns that DNR may be interested in reducing or eliminating opportunities for non-state agencies to file reservation of water applications. My understanding is that few applications from federal or NGO organizations have been processed over the years, and it is probably frustrating for DNR to see the long queue of applications – some of which were filed many years ago and may no longer meet hoped-for standards of evidence that DNR currently requires to grant water reservations. But if that is the problem, then DNR probably shares responsibility for developing clearer guidelines for

applications or being tardy in processing those applications when they were filed (rather than decades later).

My first river project in the state in 1988 was helping BLM assess instream flow needs for a water reservation application on the Gulkana River – and I was in the room when DNR leaders were actively encouraging the federal agencies to apply for reservations under the state law (AS 46.15.145) and program rather than asserting federal reserved water rights for the National Wild and Scenic River. I still think that is the better mechanism – federal and state agencies collaborating within each other's systems rather than battling in courtrooms with added expenses and deteriorating relationships.

We did our work trying to understand the river's hydrology and associate flows with different river values (fish, wildlife, recreation, and navigation) so it could be used in either legal venue — and a state water reservation application was submitted. But as my career winds down 35 years later, DNR has still not processed that application, even though BLM has cooperated with the state to collect and refine its data with some updated hydrology or other information to meet current standards. So if the goal is to improve the process for outside agencies to apply and receive reservations, I'm supportive so long as DNR doesn't penalize earlier applicants because DNR did not process applications in a more timely manner. But if the goal is to just make those applications go away, or not allow them in the future, I'm wondering why?

DNR (and F&G) already has enough on their plates. If you can get other agencies or organizations (with arguably more or at least different funding resources) to do the work of collecting baseline hydrology; identifying river values (e.g., fish and wildlife, habitat, recreation, navigation etc.); associating water reservation needs for them; and completing application documents in sufficient detail to show that such flows or water levels are ordinarily/naturally present — why wouldn't you want to encourage that work to be done? The statue and the program allows DNR to review applications based on the best public interest. That review can consider whether there is sufficient evidence for the values and flows described in the application, and there is even a mechanism for additional review every decade (after a reservation is granted) to be sure the values are still relevant and should continue to be protected.

The current law and regulations are probably the best in the nation; the DNR program that allows water reservation protection is likewise important. I'd like to see DNR improve its track record on considering and protecting water reservations before they jettison the entire concept that allows other organizations to help DNR identify and provide evidence for reservation protection.

Reservation of water protection for recreation and navigation remains important

Perhaps it goes without saying that I think it is important to protect instream flows in rivers and water levels in lakes for recreation, aesthetics, wildlife, and fishery values. I primarily work on rivers, including over a hundred studies across the country; I've seen how out-of-stream diversions, withdrawals, and impoundments have adversely affected boating, fishing, and tourism when state agencies do not adequately protect those instream uses. About a third of my projects are focused on restoring flows (or entire rivers through dam removal) from rivers after too much water was removed or diverted. Even decades later – even if there is broad agency, stakeholder, and community consensus that flows or

water levels need to be restored – it is exceedingly contentious and difficult to "turn back the clock" or "get the river back."

Alaska has a far better solution through its laws, regulations, and program. It allows DNR to review river and lake values, consider their hydrology, and assess flow and water level needs **before** miners, oil companies, and other consumptive industries take too much. A priori identification of instream flow and water level needs also helps those industries recognize better vs. worse water sources that will satisfy their needs in balance with water reservation needs. An orderly consideration of all water needs is the key to identifying appropriate places and times when surplus water may be available.

Alaska has the benefit of being a later-development state and we can avoid the mistakes of others. Everyone recognizes that mining, oil, and industrial development needs some water, but there are also important benefits in keeping the state's rivers and lakes healthy. Tourism will continue to be one of the state's biggest economic sectors, and healthy fish, wildlife, and recreation environments are starting points for attracting and keeping it from decline. There is plenty of water in Alaska rivers and lakes for economic development – but the state should be careful not to commit any and all its water for extractive uses or for one source. The water reservation law and its regulations can and should be used to carefully consider where and when out-of-stream water use makes the most sense and in the best public interest.

DNR should aim for consistency in its agency endeavors

For over 12 years I've been working with DNR to document boatable river segments as part of its navigability program. The work has successfully identified state rights for hundreds of miles of river and submerged lands, based in part on documenting the boatability and historical use of those river segments. The methods we use in that work are the same used to identify instream flow needs for recreational boating and navigation. But if one arm of DNR is using this information to identify why the state should own and manage specific river segments, a different arm of the same agency should recognize and respect such methods when they are used to identify the flows needed to provide high quality recreation or adequate navigation. This same concept should apply for lake navigability and water levels that can be secured as water reservations.

The water reservation law and accompanying regulations allow DNR to develop guidelines and review the work of other agencies when requesting and applying for an instream flow reservation. DNR should use this scoping process of the existing regulations to provide greater clarity among those guidelines, ensuring that they are consistent with the standards of evidence DNR itself uses when asserting navigability on rivers and no greater than those applied for other types of appropriations of water (withdrawals, diversions, and impoundments).

I hope these comments are helpful. I look forward to a summary report of public comment, your conclusions based upon that input, and an outline of DNR's next steps implementation strategy.

On behalf of Wild Salmon Center and SalmonState, please accept the following scoping comments on the Department of Natural Resources' ("DNR") potential changes to Alaska's water reservation regulations. Water is one of our most precious resources and supports the overall productivity and health of Alaska's fisheries. We support the beneficial use of water across the state and recognize the need to appropriate surplus water for a variety of uses. However, to keep our fisheries strong and to protect vital fish habitat, appropriations must be balanced with the "general reservation of water for fish and wildlife" as required by the Alaska Constitution. Yet, over the years, DNR has established a water management system that is far from equitable. We submit the following comments and recommend that DNR modify the instream flow water reservation system to fix the fundamental problems with the application of the law to make it consistent with the Alaska Constitution.

I. DNR's current regulations fail to establish a balanced water management system and a fair water reservation application process.

Under the current regulatory scheme, an applicant for a water reservation must provide much more information to demonstrate that water should be left in a waterbody to protect fish and wildlife habitat than is required for an application to take water out.² DNR requires rigorous data and informational requirements to support a reservation application which may take three or more years to collect.³ In contrast, applications for both a water right and temporary water use permit need only provide minimal

information and descriptions about the water use and neither process requires data to demonstrate that the water withdrawal requested will not harm fish and wildlife habitat.⁴

Not only is the water reservation application process unnecessarily tedious, it is also very costly. To gather the required information, applicants may spend hundreds of thousands of dollars. And, once submitted, the applications languish in the system.⁵ As a result, DNR has a backlog of hundreds of applications for instream flow reservations from the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, federal natural resource agencies, Alaska Native Tribes, and other non-governmental organizations.⁶ To create a fair system, DNR should propose regulations that alleviate the financial burden on applicants, create fair informational requirements for instream flow reservations and establish a timeframe to adjudicate perfected applications.

II. DNR should not restrict applicants from holding water reservation certificates.

In 2021, DNR proposed amendments to 11 AAC 94.146 that would have prevented Alaska Native Tribes, businesses, and nongovernmental organizations that depend on fisheries and healthy fish habitat to hold a certificate of water reservation. Consistent with the Alaska Constitution, the legislature determined that "[w]herever occurring in a natural state, the water is reserved to the people for common use and is subject to appropriation and beneficial use and to the reservation of instream flows…." Nothing in this policy directive indicates that water reservations can only be held by a government entity as previously proposed.⁸

DNR should properly allow any applicant of a perfected instream flow application to hold the water reservation certificate. If the legislature intended to restrict the entities that could hold a certificate, then it would have indicated that in statute. The relevant provision allows "[t]he state, an agency or a political subdivision of the state, and agency of the United States, or a person" to apply for a reservation of water. There is no ambiguity in the statutory language and DNR should not propose regulations that create unnecessary restrictions on which applicants can apply for or hold certificates.

In addition, the water reservation certificate only ensures that a necessary baseline amount of water will be kept in a waterway to protect fish habitat. It does not confer the right on the certificate holder to prevent the appropriation of any surplus water. Rather than restrict applicants from holding certificates, DNR can instead specify the terms, conditions and responsibilities of the certificate holder when it issues a water reservation similar to what DNR does with the issuance of a water right.

III. DNR should consider the economic benefits of creating an automatic instream flow reservation.

We encourage DNR to consider the economic benefits of a water management system that automatically reserves a baseline allocation of water in all of Alaska's rivers, lakes and streams. An automatic reservation of water would create a fair and equitable system to protect our water resources and fisheries for the benefit of all Alaskans. Existing science-based, hydrological metrics can be utilized to identify how much water should be reserved based on the stream-type and geographic location of the water body. This system would establish a fair and balanced system and alleviate the administrative burden on DNR to adjudicate the backlog of instream flow applications.

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To Whom It May Concern:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment, and for extending the comment period. I would like to first make you aware that the comment portal (https://dnr.alaska.gov/mlw/comment/) shows the comment period as closed and it is not possible to submit a comment on Water Reservations through the portal. This demonstrates the importance of having multiple mechanisms for submitting comments, and I appreciate that email is one of the options.

In my current position (with Chickaloon Native Village) I collect field meter readings of streams in the Matanuska Valley on a monthly basis. In my previous work (with Center for Science in Public Participation), I became aware of the process for Temporary Water Use Permits and the importance of in-stream flow reservations. As a private citizen, I serve on the Mat-Su Borough Fish & Wildlife Commission (FWC). In these comments, I speak only for myself, and not on behalf of any organization, but wanted to provide DNR with relevant information on my background.

DNR has requested public comment on specific topics.

- 11 AAC 93.142 (Content of application)
 - Should additional information be required to justify the need for a reservation of water?
 - What types of data and methodology?
- 11 AAC 93.146 (Issuance of a certificate of reservation of water)
 - Should only State resource agencies, such as DNR or Alaska Department of Fish and Game, hold the certificate of a reservation of water?
 - Who should hold a certificate of a reservation of water?
- 11 AAC 93.147 (Review of a reservation of water)
 - Are the review requirements clear and adequate?

I support the comments made by the FWC on these topics.

In my personal comment letter here, I want to emphasize funding and science.

1. Funding

In general, the current system for issuing water reservations would work well if it were adequately funded. To my knowledge, there is a single employee that processes applications, and recently reviewing past applications has been added to that workload. Please provide additional funding for the water reservation program.

2. Science and 11 AAC 93.146

The ability for the general public to provide good science should not be ignored. For example, the national CoCoRAHS effort (https://www.cocorahs.org) provides interested parties with a standardized catchment gauge and measuring tube to record precipitation (rain, hail, snow). The data is now being used by weather forecasters (https://www.cocorahs.org/Content.aspx?page=CoCoRaHS_Uses). This is possible because of the number of people providing good data, and because many are in locations not covered by agency weather stations.

State (and federal) agencies are chronically underfunded relative to the vast amount of work that could be done to understand streams, rivers, and fisheries in Alaska. This is not going to change. Current law allows agencies, Tribes, non-profit organizations, and individuals to receive in-stream flow reservation certificates. Certificates are only issued after the interested party has gathered at least five years of quality data. The process is not only long, it is expensive. Certificates of water reservation may be the primary impetus that causes interested parties to spend the time and money to conduct the good science required. Allowing not only agencies but other groups to gather stream flow data is an extraordinary opportunity for everyone to benefit from high quality citizen science, and DNR should support that effort as long as the process is standardized and approved by ADFG and USGS. **DNR should continue to allow all individuals or organizations with the ability and capacity to receive an in-stream flow reservation certificate to hold it.**

3. Science and 11 AAC 93.142

Although the current requirements are adequate, it could be tremendously useful to require applicants to conduct temperature monitoring at the stream flow gauge. There are inexpensive data loggers that can record temperature every few minutes, hours, or days. Hourly data could contribute to the new AK Temp database (https://aktemp.uaa.alaska.edu/) for an even greater understanding of Alaska streams for very little additional cost.
