


The proposed name is to commemorate Ivan E. "Hank" Every who homesteaded on the lake. Every came to Alaska with his wife and small son in June 1956. In March 1962 the family moved to the homestead. After moving to the Kenai Peninsula, Every worked at the Standard Oil Refinery in Nikiski, at Wildwood Air Force Base, and as a sheet metal worker locally and on construction of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. His passion was fishing, and for 47 years he had a commercial setnet fishing site at nearby Boulder Point. Early was one of the incorporators and an active member of the Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association, serving on its Board of Directors from 1976 to 1972. He was the association's representative on the Cook Inlet Regional Planning team from 1978 to 1995. 






Longtime Alaskan, homesteader and commercial fisherman, Ivan E. "Hank" Every, 83, passed away Monday, October 7, 2014 at Riverside Assisted Living in Soldotna.

Hank was born in Endicott, New York on December 5, 1930, to Margaret Helena (Roosa) and Homer Every, together with his twin sister, Ina Mae. His twin passed on December 31, 1930.





lvan E. (Hank) Every 1930 – 2014

Longtime Alaskan, homesteader and commercial fisherman, Ivan E. "Hank" Every, 83, passed away Monday, October 7, 2014 at Riverside Assisted Living in Soldotna.

Hank was born in Endicott, New York on December 5, 1930, to Margaret Helena (Roosa) and Homer Every, together with his twin sister, Ina Mae. His twin passed on December 31, 1930.

On February 25, 1948 at the age of 17, he enlisted in the United States Air Force. He was honorably discharged on September 1, 1953. While stationed in England, he participated in the "Berlin Airlift" for which he received the "Humane Action Medal". After returning to the States, Hank was stationed at Forbes Air Force Base in Topeka, Kansas, where he met and married his wife Marilyn on April 27, 1952.

After leaving the Military, they resided in North Platte, Nebraska, where he trained as a sheet metal worker. A co-worker had two nephews homesteading in the Wasilla area and that became his desire. In June of 1956, along with wife and small son, he headed to Alaska. They lived in Anchorage until March of 1962 when they moved onto their homestead in North Kenai.

His various jobs included Senior Cook in the Air Force, cook for the Alaska Railroad in Birchwood, Sheet Metal Worker at Ft. Richardson, Operator at Standard Oil Refinery in Nikiski, Water Treatment Operator at Wildwood Air Force Base, and Union Sheet Metal Worker locally and on the construction of the Alyeska Pipeline.

Hank's passion in life was commercial fishing. His love of fishing was handed down through the four generations of the Every family, nearly all of which are still actively involved in the set net fishery. For 47 years he was committed to the commercial fishing industry.

The Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association wrote, "Hank was a long-time advocate for and an active participant in the Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association. He was one of the original incorporators of the Association and served on its interim Board of Directors from 1976 to

1978. Hank also represented the Commercial Fisherman of Cook's Inlet on the Association's regular Board from 1978 through 1995, in all serving 20 years. He served as the Association's Secretary from 1980 through 1992 and as the Association's representatives on the Cook Inlet Regional Planning Team from 1978 through 1995. Hank was instrumental in salmon enhancement projects throughout Cook Inlet. Not only did he advocate for salmon enhancement projects, he was also willing to help with construction as he did on the Scurvy Creek fish ladder in 1981."

He was preceded in death by his parents, sisters Constance, Wanda, Ina Mae, and Joan; brothers Homer, James, and John.

He is survived by his wife of 62 years, Marilyn, and their six children, Gary L. Every, Christopher P. (Lori) Every, William J. (Marilyn) Every of Port Orchard, Washington, Angel Haines of Endicott, New York, Romanye R. (Tom) Hindman, Camille Clucas and son in-law, Bobby Clucas, special niece Terry Saldana of Anchorage and close friends Frosty and Virginia Walters;

Sisters Mary Ellen Hambalek, Margurite Kjilgaard, Linda Browne, Martha Vadnais, Susan Gentile and Sherry Ann Muller, and brother Robert Every;


