The lake is at mile 33.5 of the Kenai Spur Highway, north of the community of Nikiski in the northwest corner of the Kenai Peninsula. The low-lying region is characterized by numerous lakes.

The proposed name is to commemorate Ivan E. "Hank" Every who homesteaded on the lake. Every came to Alaska with his wife and small son in June 1956. In March 1962 the family moved to the homestead. After moving to the Kenai Peninsula, Every worked at the Standard Oil Refinery in Nikiski, at Wildwood Air Force Base, and as a sheet metal worker locally and on construction of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. His passion was fishing, and for 47 years he had a commercial set-net fishing site at nearby Boulder Point. Early was one of the incorporators and an active member of the Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association, serving on its Board of Directors from 1976 to 1972. He was the association's representative on the Cook Inlet Regional Planning team from 1978 to 1995. He advocated for salmon enhancement projects and helped construct the Scurvy Creek fish ladder in 1981. Every died in 2014.

Members of the family own 20 acres around the lake and have lived there for 60 years. Other owners include Mark and Meredith Hedlund, Cook Inlet Region, Inc., Alaska Mental Health Trust, and Kilauea Trust. The proposer did not contact them about the proposed name.

## Ivan Hank Every

*December 5, 1930 - October 7, 2014*

Longtime Alaskan, homesteader and commercial fisherman, Ivan E. "Hank" Every, 83, passed away Monday, October 7, 2014 at Riverside Assisted Living in Soldotna.

Hank was born in Endicott, New York on December 5, 1930, to Margaret Helena (Roosa) and Homer Every, together with his twin sister, Ina Mae. His twin passed on December 31, 1930.

On February 25, 1948 at the age of 17, he enlisted in the United States Air Force. He was honorably discharged on September 1, 1953. While stationed in England, he participated in the "Berlin Airlift" for which he received the "Humane Action Medal". After returning to the States, Hank was stationed at Forbes Air Force Base in Topeka, Kansas, where he met and married his wife Marilyn on April 27, 1952.

After leaving the Military, they resided in North Platte, Nebraska, where he trained as a sheet metal worker. A co-worker had two nephews homesteading in the Wasilla area and that became his desire. In June of 1956, along with wife and small son, he headed to Alaska. They lived in Anchorage until March of 1962 when they moved onto their homestead in North Kenai.

His various jobs included Senior Cook in the Air Force, cook for the Alaska Railroad in Birchwood, Sheet Metal Worker at Ft. Richardson, Operator at Standard Oil Refinery in Nikiski, Water Treatment Operator at Wildwood Air Force Base, and Union Sheet Metal Worker locally and on the construction of the Alyeska Pipeline.

Hank's passion in life was commercial fishing. His love of fishing was handed down through the four generations of the Every family, nearly all of which are still actively involved in the set net fishery. For 47 years he was committed to the commercial fishing industry.

The Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association wrote, ". Hank was a long-time advocate for and an active participant in the Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association. He was one of the original incorporators of the Association and served on its interim Board of Directors from 1976 to 1978. Hank also represented the Commercial Fisherman of Cook's Inlet on the Association's regular Board from 1978 through 1995, in all serving 20 years. He served as the Association's Secretary from 1980 through 1992 and as the Association's representatives on the Cook Inlet Regional Planning Team from 1978 through 1995. Hank was instrumental in salmon enhancement projects throughout Cook Inlet. Not only did he

advocate for salmon enhancement projects, he was also willing to help with construction as he did on the Scurvy Creek fish ladder in 1981."

He is survived by his wife of 62 years, Marilyn, and their six children, Gary L. Every, Christopher P. (Lori) Every, William J. (Marilyn) Every of Port Orchard, Washington, Angel Haines of Endicott, New York, Romanye R. (Tom) Hindman, Camille Clucas and son in-law, Bobby Clucas, special niece Terry Saldana of Anchorage and close friends Frosty and Virginia Walters.

To Whom It May Concern,

I live in Kenai, Alaska and recently retired from the Cook Inlet Aquaculture Association (CIAA). CIAA is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation dedicated to salmon fisheries enhancement throughout the Cook Inlet area. I served as CIAA's biologist from mid-1990 through late 1996 when I was promoted to the Executive Director position from which I retired in 2018. While working at CIAA, I had the opportunity to work with many extraordinary people and, as a trained limnologist, to work on many remarkable waterbodies throughout the Cook Inlet area.

Ivan "Hank" Every was one of the remarkable people I had the opportunity to work with at CIAA. Hank homesteaded north of Nikiski, Alaska and commercial fished Cook Inlet for many years. He was a visionary, cofounding CIAA and serving on its Board of Directors until his retirement. He was a leader on the Board, a strong advocate for good management, and always put the resource first over harvest or economic opportunities. I appreciated Hank's dedication to the salmon resource and the unique mentoring he provided.

Early in my career I was given the opportunity to investigate several small lakes for enhancement of salmon populations. One of these lakes, known locally as "Hanks Lake," was located near the Every homestead. I concluded this small lake had only limited potential for salmon population enhancement, but visited the lake to collect limnologic data several times during my tenure at CIAA. CIAA has maintained a file on Hanks Lake for over 30 years.

Ivan "Hank" Every deserves to be commemorated with a lake named after him.


To whom it May Concern:

Our family came from Idaho to North Kenai in 1971 to commercial fish. We had purchased a site near Arness Dock. From the first day, Hank Every mentored us through all the beginner's mistakes and helped get us settled into the lifestyle of being a fisherman, and living in Alaska.

Our families became close friends and remain so with Marilyn and kids. We spent many happy times at the homestead in the early days of 'the cabin' and since the main dwelling was built in the eighties.

In the beginning, it was Marilyn who maintained the homestead and the children while Hank was working away to support them. Later, when fishing became the main occupation, the entire family worked together to make it successful, Their home on the hill overlooking the lake was always their 'safe space' where they could relax and let down.

Marilyn still maintains the 'homestead' overlooking the lake. Naming the lake in the family's honor would be a fitting tribute to the persistence and hard-working attitude of early Alaskans.

Virginia Walter's sister was my doctor's nurse. When I would go into Anchorage for checkups, we would visit. She told me her sister and husband wanted to move to Alaska. Her sister would finish her college and would teach in rural Alaska. Her husband wanted to purchase fish sites.

Virginia Finished college and got a job at Healy. With the help of Hank, Frosty got his fish site.

We first met the Walters (actually our son Gary was the first to meet them) in 1971 on the back road to our beach site. Frosty was stuck in a huge mud hole. It ended up that their beach trailer was next door to our beach cabins.

Soon after the Walters were asked to move off the site where their trailer was parked and Hank told Frosty to go ahead and build a cabin on our property.

So, for the next few years, until they sold their fish site in 1987, we spent our summers on the beach, living side by side. At that time we fished from May 15 until as late in the fall as we wanted to. The Walters would return to Healy (later Circle) for the winter.

Later Virginia came into Anchorage for more schooling and ended up teaching at Kenai Central High School and retired from there. The Walters bought a home in Kenai where they still reside.

We still remain close friends.

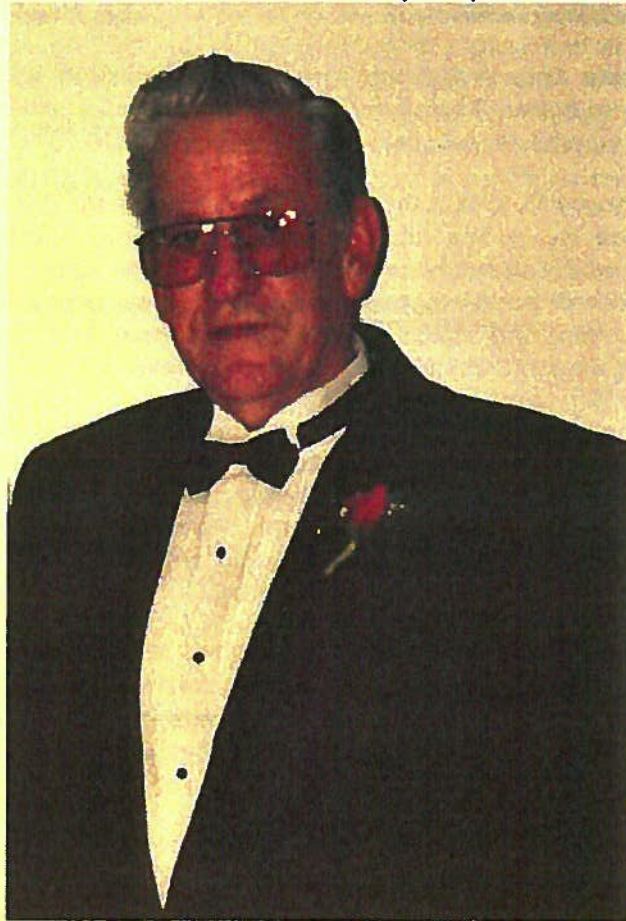

**Longtime Alaskan, homesteader and commercial fisherman, Ivan E. "Hank" Every, 83, passed away Monday, October 7, 2014 at Riverside Assisted Living in Soldotna.**


