#### RESOLUTION OF CONCERN REGARDING FUNDING FOR THE OFFICE OF HISTORY & ARCHAEOLOGY

WHEREAS, the Alaska Historical Commission is a citizen's board of the State of Alaska charged with advising the Governor and Legislature on matters regarding the state's history and archaeology; and

WHEREAS, the Alaska Historical Commission reviews and makes recommendations for the State Historic Preservation
Office programs of the Office of History and Archaeology, Alaska Department of Natural Resources, as established by
the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and for which Alaska has an approved state program; and

WHEREAS, the programs are annually funded by a federal grant from the National Historic Preservation Fund administered by the National Park Service that must be matched 40% with state funds; and

WHEREAS, the federal grant is for the state's Office of History and Archaeology as well as for distribution to local governments with approved preservation programs and to owners to rehabilitate recognized historic properties around the state, and hence, it is administratively brought into the state through both capital and operating budgets; and

WHEREAS, the proposed FY20 state capital budget does not include \$150,000 in required state General Fund Match money or the authorization to bring in subsequent available federal grants, up to \$500,000 (about half of the federal grant) to be distributed to communities and owners of historic properties; and

WHEREAS, not having the authorization or funds will hinder the state in preservation of its heritage, hamper required environmental review of resource development projects, and threaten the state's approved status to qualify for the annual federal grant;

NOW THEREFORE, the Alaska Historical Commission asks that the \$150,000 in state general fund match in the FY20 capital budget for the National Historic Preservation Fund be restored, as well as authorization to bring in the federal funds with a line item of \$500,000 for it—recognizing these are needed for the State of Alaska to have an approved State Historic Preservation Office and program, and importantly, will not unnecessarily impede state development projects.



The intent of the new historic revitalization grants is to "revitalize, restore and protect historic properties and foster economic development of rural villages and downtown areas." The OHA will be collecting information on properties to apply next year. Funds will not have to be matched.

There are several other federal historic preservation programs, among them the Maritime Heritage grant program and National Heritage Areas that are not HPF funded.



- Met September 25, 2018 and February 25, 2019
- 2 members reappointed last July,; 2 members terms end June 30, 2019.
- Renewed recommendation to Governor that the 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue Theatre be designated an Alaska Landmark Site.
- Reviewed and approved 9 proposed names for undersea features in the eastern Bering Sea, and proposals to name Mount Mary and Santa Ana Peak near Seward, Luna Lake near Sitka, and to change the official name Chenega Bay to Chenega.
- Reviewed grant proposals and recommended awards for 5 CLG projects and 15 development / predevelopment projects.
- Alaska State Parks, Office of History and Archaeology recognized with 2018 Ney Landrum Park History Award from the National Association of Park Directors for program to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Alaska Treaty of Cession.

#### Substantive issues:

- Federal agencies given power to determine if historic resources on federal lands should be determined eligible for or nominated to the NRHP. This includes control of whether to nominate properties under the agency's jurisdiction. Giving a Federal agency, not the Keeper, final say on eligibility of a property under its jurisdiction potentially thwarts consultation on a project.
- 2. A historic district nomination can be blocked if just one property is owned by a federal agency and it objects to the nomination.
- 3. Objections to listing will be based on ownership of majority of the *land area* in addition to the current counting of one private owner, one vote. The burden to implement this will be placed on the SHPO. There is no statutory authority for the concept of "land area."
- 4. Federal agencies given virtually total control over determining which historic resources on federal lands should be protected. This takes away the right for an individual or local government to appeal the failure of a federal agency to nominate a property.












## HISTORIC REHABILITATION TAX CREDIT PROGRAM

Red John's Cabin Talkeetna







## Project Archaeology: the Ahtna Winter House Module


- Project Archaeology Investigating Shelter Module
  - Part of an integrated set of lessons that teach about science, a traditional culture, and archaeological site preservation using archaeology and a study of that culture's house (~5<sup>th</sup> grade level).
  - Currently: N.W. Coast Plank House, North Slope Wrulik, and now Ahtna Winter House
- The Ahtna Winter House Module
  - Written by Bill Simeone
  - Graphics and additional text by Tom Gillispie
  - The module is being formatted by national Project Archaeology staff.
  - To be taught in the Copper River School District and available to teachers nationally online
  - Made possible by financial support from BLM and NPS.



#### Investigating an Ahtna Winter House Archaeology Notebook

Student Archaeologist

In this investigation you will use geography, history, cultural traditions and archaeology to learn about an Ahtma Winter House and the people who lived there. You will look at historic photographs and read oral histories. You will "make" an archaeological site and classify artifacts. You will infer how the geographic location of the Ahtma people shaped the winter house. You will use what you learned to plan and draw a winter house that has the important features of the Ahtma house. In a final composition you will report what you learned.




