Determinations of Eligibility are regulations that provide guidance to Federal agencies in identifying and evaluating if a property located on lands under their jurisdiction or on lands to be affected by proposed actions is eligible for inclusion in the National Register. The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the Nation's historic places worthy of preservation. So, what's the difference, and, more importantly, what's the point of getting a property determined eligible "listed" in the National Register?
